PTA Literacy Corner – DECEMBER 2020

Why is diverse literature so important?

When choosing books for children it is important to select books that act as "mirrors and windows". "Mirrors" contain stories that allow children to see themselves in what they read. It helps children develop a sense of belonging. This type of text also reinforces the child's own cultural identity and allows them to better understand how society perceives their culture. "Windows" on the other hand, are stories that help children learn about people and cultures that are diffrent from their own. They also allow children to make connections between their culture and others..

What will students learn this month?

1st Grade
