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I'm not just a scribble activities

When children are young, their colouring artwork looks like a bunch of... At least for adults. But their creations aren't just scridy – they have color, character, shape, and personality! That's why I love Diane Alber's book, I'm not just a scrid... The protagonist (Scribble) and other illustrations in the book are completely relatable to young artists. And the story is full of beautiful and important acceptance, despite the differences. We love everything about this book... especially a sticker sheet that encourages readers to create their own sciling art! We gave our daughter this amazing children's book for her recent birthday and it was an instant hit! She immediately fell in love with Scribble and all her colorful makeovers. He's incredibly friendly and so eager to play. But other drawings don't want anything to do with Scribble... They think his lines are too messy and his colors are too bright. Their distaste for his differences and unique character traits makes Scribble a bit blue... but it won't keep him down for long – he'll change his color and march forward! And before you know that, they all become friends and create something magical together! After reading Scribble's story several times, we were inspired to create our own scribbles. So we grabbed our scribbling stickers, various sheets of paper, crayons, marks and oil sting... and went on a creative journey. When we started, we couldn't stop. We made scrided scrides... and we loved every minute! I loved watching the scrids of our little nugget come to life. It wasn't long before he declared himself an official sticker picker... carefully selecting each pair of eyeballs and a smile for each scride. We spent a lot of over an hour creating all our scrilings (and we still have a lot of stickers left to do even more!) The colouring utensils favoured by our little nugget were definitely signs, while I fell in love with the vibrant and bold expressions of the oil paste. Needless to say, all our scridies now happily adorn an entire wall in our dining room. ☺, we can't wait to do more! I'm actually interested in trying our hand with oil pastel and watercolor resistors (as the photo paper mural in our post has). Seriously, if you haven't grabbed a copy of me yet, I'm not just a scrib... Diane Alber, you should get one right now! It's a beautiful story and a creative art project, all rolled into one clever package. I'm Not Just a Scribble is an inspiring picture book for primary school students. We love the morality of this story and know that teachers do too! - Jodi and starts with the story team Story I'm not just a scrid... is about Scribble, who looks a little different from other pictures, but knows he is special. Throughout the story, Scribble goes into different pictures and asks if he can play with them. The pictures say no and point out that scriding looks different from them and is the messiest and more colorful. Scridy stays true to itself and doesn't let them get him down. At the end of the case, other photos apologize to Scribble and ask him to play with them. The images create a large, beautiful image because they all work together. Students love this story of diversity and staying true to themselves. Here are some ways you can use I'm Not a Scribble in your class. Study how the author uses rhyme throughout the story. Discuss the author's purpose for writing a book. Ask students to write about their personal contacts with the story. Students must write songs depicting the protagonist. Teach students about quotation marks and what they are used for. Check and practice using non-lonely and adjectives. Lead the class discussion on forgiveness and apology. Language and learning tips When reading a book, focus on the feelings of the protagonist, Scribble. How did he feel at the beginning of the book? How did it feel when Scribble was disqualified? What about at the end of the book? Discuss the idea of acceptance and forgiveness. Has your child even felt left out? Discuss the time you apologized for something you did wrong. This book has several layers and can be read several times to young children. For younger children, they can enjoy verses and illustrations. For older children, the teacher and/or parent can focus on the book's more abstract lessons, such as emotions and working through a challenging problem. This book can help lead the debate on inclusive and diverse. How do we make others feel involved?
