Participating teachers and librarians should devote a reasonable period of time to activities that will promote the award programme. Its school or library should have as many of the titles on the nominated list as possible available for circulation. Children in the 4th, 5th and 6th grades can vote if they have read or heard at least five of the books in Master List 2019 read or heard read aloud. Participating teachers will encourage each eligible child to vote for their preferred book and count the class votes and present them to the coordinator, who may be the librarian, the reading specialist or another delegate to take on this responsibility. Note: Only the final votes for a favorite, one for each child, are sent to Salem State University (no ranking). The coordinator works with several schools or libraries, he/she should submit an official vote for each location; this will ensure that a certificate is sent for each participating school or library. View the 2012-13 Winners 2012-13 Winners 2012-13 Master List 2011-2012 Winners 2011-2012 Master List For The Three Years, Salem State University has partnered with Salem Public Schools to provide intensive literacy interventions for high-risk elementary students, with priority for English-speaking students and children from small backgrounds. Salem Public School staff identified students entering grades 1-5 to participate in the program hosted at Bentley School. The summer program lasted four weeks during July. Bentley Summer Program had three underlying goals: Each child will read something good every day. Our curriculum is the needs of the child. Each interaction leads to more independence. To achieve these goals, a science-based theme provided a focus on content and guided reading within small groups enabled targeted literacy interventions. Teachers selected an ocean topic (shipbuilding science, ocean as a source of life, understanding the behaviour of marine animals, etc.); experiments, tours and videos designed and planned to support content learning; and supported students' learning by reading and writing extensive informative texts. The core of The Bentley Summer program has been guided by reading. The children were grouped according to needs and taught individually or in groups of up to four students. Guided reading training took place for at least an hour each day and was a major factor in the extraordinary gains of experienced students in reading. A month later from the Bentley Summer Program, the results of the assessment read indicated that students had an average of 3.7 months. Six students (15%) increased between four and six months. Seven students (17.5%) had more than seven and a half months of growth after only four weeks of intervention. Seven children (14%), who had previously been reading below the grade level, have now progressed to reading on or above the grade level as a result of the interventions they received in the Bentley Summer Program. In the summer of 2014, Salem at SEA (Summer ELL Academy) engaged 40 English learners in a one-month program designed to improve their English language and literacy skills in the context of rich context of rich content learning. Funded by a Gateway grant from the Executive Office of Education of the Community, the programme provided the advancement of the 9th to 12th grades with an interdisciplinary experience, based on literacy, summer enrichment, focused on theme of globalisation in Salem. Participating students received scholarships from Salem City for their work at an exhibition entitled Global Salem. Participating students received scholarships from Salem. University and Salem Public Schools worked with community partners to design Salem at the SEA curriculum. To support individualised and small-group training, four classes with 10 students per class were taught as a team by history and ESL teachers. One of the key elements of the programme was strong collaboration between several major agencies and organisations in the larger Salem region. With a base of origin on the Salem State University campus, students have been provided with higher education experience at a critical age of decision-making. The city of Salem supported the option of exposing and hiring students; Salem Cyberspace (now LEAP for Education) has provided college and career counseling, guidance and family information; The Essex National Heritage Commission made links to the community and historic sites and organised excursions; and the North Shore Workforce Investment Board provided support for employment and career exploration. Early College in Salem, funded by a grant from the Executive Office of Education, is a collaborative program offered by Salem State University and Salem High School.
