North Haven Fire Department/Facebook at least 120 delivery trucks administered by the U.S. Postal Service have caught fire within the past five years, and there will likely have been more in the lifetime of this 30-plus-year truck, Trucks.com reported. There is no theory about a cause and no repairs in place. There is still no definitive alternative to grumman's long-life car (LLV), first introduced in 1987.
