

To what extent answer

This lesson will guide you on how to write essays in IELTS Writing that ask to what extent you agree/disagree. Such questions are very common for the IELTS Writing 2 task. In such essays, your job is to say whether: I totally agree with a given statement completely disagree with a given statement partially agree/disagree and justify your opinion. In this lesson, you'll see IELTS writing task 2 sample question + model answer. In addition, you will learn the following points: how to decide on your opinion, how to give the team 9 answers to the question I agree / disagree, to what extent you agree / disagree example IELTS writing task 2: This is a classic example of IELTS Writing a question that asks to what extent you agree or disagree. Contrary to classic questions I agree/disagree to the extent to which you agree or disagree with the questions you do not ask to clearly state whether you agree or disagree with a particular statement. In fact, you have 3 main options for your opinion: AA: We totally agree (provide 2 ideas that reinforce the statement) DD: Totally disagree (give 2 ideas that weaken the statement) AD: You agree or disagree partially (give 1 idea that reinforces the statement and 1 idea that weakens it) After you have decided your opinion, generate 2-3 help points for it. Now let's generate support points for each of the reviews: AA: Investment in art, music and theater is a waste of money Art, music and theater do not help solve the urgent problems of society Art and music can develop as a hobby, and the money saved can be directed to the urgent needs of society If artists and music can develop as a hobby. music and theater is not a waste of money Art and music retain a unique culture and heritage, passing on the cultural character of the nation and traditions to future generations Art, music and theater are an integral part of the cultural and intellectual development of society and entertainment Strong art, the music and theater sector is an economic asset that creates new jobs and attracts income from tourism AD : Investment in the arts is important, but public services should be financed primarily In this opinion, it is enough to combine ideas from previous points. For our essay we will choose the last opinion - we partially agree / disagree (AD). There are many ways to organize your essay, but we will use a structure that has been approved by many IELTS examiners to be highly scored and consistent. Band-9 essay structure: Introduction Body point 1 - 1 point Body point 2 - 2 helppoint Conclusion As you already know, you can write auxiliary points of your body paragraphs as follows: + agree, disagree + disagree, agree + disagree. We will use the last option because our opinion is partially agree/disagree. Let's take a closer look at each of these sections. Introduction Write your introduction in two sentences: Sentence 1 - to paraphrase the statement (you can use it is claimed / for / thinks that to begin with): Sentence 2 - express your opinion: Body point 1 - 1 auxiliary point Sentence 1 - give the first reason you agree / disagree. Since we are considering the opposite opinion, it is good to use the phrase on the other hand to present the second reason: Sentences 2-3 - explain the reason (suppose your examiner does not understand the subject at all): Sentence 4 - support your idea for examples, plus we have already written a lot in this paragraph, so we will omitting this point. Sentence 5 - a brief summary of your thoughts in the second paragraph. Application You can write a request in one sentence that summarizes your opinion + 2 reasons: DO NOT write new ideas to finish! On the other hand, art, music and theatre are not a waste of money, as they are an integral part of the cultural and intellectual development of society and entertainment. First, art and music attract people's attention to different phenomena and represent the inner meaning of things. Quite often one drawing, piece or song can exhort a lot of people to rethink their attitude to some situation. In this way, art is the main source of personal and intellectual development of the nation. In addition, visiting museums, watching movies and listening to music are typical ways to relax and entertain. Therefore, the art sector is also important for society and should not be underestimated. (317 words) One of the most common types of questions to be displayed in history assessment tasks is one that begins with the phrase To what extent/degree.... Despite the fact that it seems so often, especially on exam papers, some teachers and students are not sure how to correctly write an answer to it. Fortunately, questions to what extent/extent are relatively easy to understand and write a sophisticated answer, as long as you know what they are specifically asking for. In this blog post, I will explain what such questions ask you to do and give you some practical tips on how to write an essay answer to the question to what extent/degree of the question, so as to feel confident in your assessment pieces. First of all, it is important to understand whether the purpose of the word degree or scope in this kind of guestion. Which one of these two words is used means exactly the same thing: they ask you to attach a degree of importance to how influential or important a particular factor in a particular topic is. That's why this kind of question itself will provide you with two elements that you want to compare. For example: To what extent was political ideology more important in Hitler's come to power than economic conditions in Germany in the early 1930s? As can be seen in this question to what extent, it is asked to decide whether political ideology was more important than economic conditions in Germany in the early 1930s. Therefore, in answering this question, you need to make it clear what you think was more important. Here's another example: To what extent has Black Death in 14th-century Europe reduced the cultural influence of the papacy compared to political scandals in the curia? Once again, it is easy to determine what is being asked to decide between: whether black death in 14th-century Europe or political scandals in the curia were more important to causing the decline of cultural influence of the papacy. However, sometimes the essay question gives you only one factor, in which case you will have to choose the second factor to compare it with. For example, To what extent was the assassination of Julius Caesar the result of his own pride? In this example, the question gives only its own hubris as one important element. Therefore, you will have to decide, based on your own historical knowledge and provided sources, something else to compare it with. However, it is still important for you to come to the conclusion which of these two elements was the most important. Once you've identified the two items you're going to compare in response, you'll need to decide which of the two options you have decided is the most important. Because essays typically require you to follow the standard five-paragraph structure (introductory paragraphs, and a conclusion paragraph), you know that you'll have three body paragraphs available to argue your decision. However, here are some rare exceptions you may need to watch out for, along with some quick tips on how to deal with them. Some questions may ask you a comparison of three separate factors. On these occasions, the question probably leads you to the argument that all three factors had the same meaning. Typically, you can assign each factor to a paragraph of content and provide one reason why each element was a contributing factor. questions can ask you to assign only a degree of importance to only one factor, without expecting you to provide a second alternative. In short, if this happens, it is probably a badly written question. Essay questions that require analysis and explanation of only one factor should probably be how or why the question.
