



Ryan anderson houston rockets contract

Sean Gardner/Getty ImagesFree-agent veteran power forward Ryan Anderson cashed in once the free agency opened, reportedly signing a four-year, \$80 million deal with the Houston Rockets, according to Adrian Wojnarowski of Vertical. Steve Kyler of Basketball Insiders reported on June 28 that the Rockets view Anderson as one of their top targets. Kyler added that Anderson was someone the Rockets pursued quite aggressively in the trade deadline, and with Mike D'Antoni as head coach, landing multiple three-point shooting is a key point for the Rockets. He played college basketball for the California Golden Bears. Early life Anderson was born in Sacramento, California[1] and attended Oak Ridge High School in nearby El Dorado Hills. [2] College career In 2005, Anderson helped lead the Oak Ridge Trojans into Division II of the California State Championship. The game took place at arco arena in Sacramento. In the opening round of this playoff series, Anderson's No.1 ranked team narrowly averted an upset against a John H. Pitman High School team led by Colin Kaepernick that would later go on to become the NFL's San Francisco 49ers quarterback. [3] In this game, Kaepernick scored 34 points, While Anderson scored 50. [4] Considered a four-star recruit for Rivals.com, Anderson was listed as the No. 22 power forward and No. 98 player in the nation in 2006. [5] College career Anderson played two seasons for the California Golden Bears at UC Berkeley, averaging 18.7 points and 9.0 rebounds per 33.0 minutes per games. [6] [7] As a rookie in 2006-07, he led the Bears in scoring and rebounding, averaging 16.3 points and 8.2 rebounds, and earned honorable mention of All-Pac-10 honors. He went on to be named second Team All-America from Sporting and earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors as a sophomore in 2007-08. He led the Pac-10 in scoring, averaging 21.1 points (ranked 18th in the nation) and ranked third in rebounds, pulling down 9.9 rebounds per game. [4] On April 3, 2008, Anderson declared for the NBA draft, renouncing his last two years of college eligibility. [8] Professional Career New Jersey Nets (2008-2009) On June 26, 2008, Anderson was selected with the 21st Century. He made his NBA debut on October 29, 2008 against the Washington Wizards. He played in 66 games during his rookie campaign with New Jersey, averaging 7.4 points and 4.7 rebounds in 19.9 minutes per game when he ranked 10th. Orlando Magic (2009-2012) On June 25, 2009, Anderson was traded, along with Vince Carter, to the Orlando Magic in exchange for Rafer Alston, Tony Battie and Courtney Lee. In the 2009-2010 season, he appeared in 63 games with Orlando, averaging 7.7 points and 3.2 rebounds in 14.5 minutes per game. He started in six games during the regular season, and played in 64 games. In 2010-11, Anderson played in 64 games (14 starts) with Orlando, averaging 10.6 points and 5.5 rebounds in 22.3 minutes per game. He missed nine games in December 2010 because of a sprained right leg. [10] In the lockout-shortened 2011-12 season, Anderson won the NBA Most Improved Player Award after averaging 16.1 points and 7.7 rebounds in 61 games. [11] He led the NBA in both three-point field goals and attempted, while ranking seventh in percentage free throws, tied for 27th. New Orleans Hornets/Pelicans (2012-16) Anderson with the Hornets in March 2013. On July 11, 2012, Anderson was acquired by the New Orleans Hornets in a sign-and-trade deal that sent Gustavo Ayón to the Magic. During his first season for the Hornets in the 2012-13 season, he played 81 games (22 starts) and averaged 16.2 points, 6.4 rebounds and 1.2 assists per game. He finished second in the NBA with a career high of 213 three-point goals in 557 attempts (38.2%).... 13] In April 2013, the Hornets changed their name to the Pelicans. On December 2, 2013, Anderson scored a careerhigh 36 points in a 131-128 triple overtime over the Chicago Bulls. Anderson suffered a neck injury on January 3, 2014, when he collided with Gerald Wallace in the Pelicans' 95-92 victory over the Boston Celtics. Anderson, who had to be removed from the court on a stretcher, required neck surgery and was ruled out for the rest of the season at the end of March. He played just 22 games in the 2013-14 season, averaging 19.8 points and 6.5 rebounds per game. On October 28, 2014, Anderson made his return to the Pelicans in their season-opening game Orlando Magic. In 22 minutes of action, he scored 22 points and nine rebounds per game. off the bench in a 101-84 victory on February 22, 2015, and was ruled out for two to four weeks after being diagnosed with an MCL sprain in his right knee. On April 1, he returned to action and played the regular season and appeared in four playoff games. Anderson remained an effective player on the Pelicans bench in 2015-16. He scored 32 points for the season on January 15, 2016, and hit six threes in a 109-107 victory over the Charlotte Hornets. On January 23, he scored 23 points and equaled a season high with six threes in a 116-99 victory over the Milwaukee Bucks. In this game, the Pelicans hit a franchise-best 17 threepointers. On January 28, he scored 30 points from a career high of 36 points in the first half of the Pelicans' 114-105 victory over the Sacramento Kings. Starting with just his seventh game of the season, at power forward in place of the injured Anthony Davis, Anderson's 30 first-half points set a franchise record. [21] After being diagnosed with a sports hernia at the end of March, Anderson missed the team's last 14 games of the season. [22] Houston Rockets (2016-2018) July 9, 2016, Anderson signed with the Houston Rockets. He made his debut for the Rockets on October 26, when he recorded 14 points and six rebounds in a 120-114 loss to the Los Angeles Lakers. On December 1, he scored a season-high 29 points in a two-game win over the Golden State Warriors 132-127. [25] During the 2017 offseason, the Rockets began work on moving Anderson to a big contract. To clear the way for a trade from Houston during the 2018 offseason, the Rockets began work on moving Anderson to a big contract. Anderson agreed to reduce the guarantee on his \$21 million salary in 2019-20 to \$15.6 million. [26] Phoenix Suns (2018-2019) August 31, 2018, Anderson was traded alongside rookie De'Anthony Melton to the Phoenix Suns in exchange for Brandon Knight and Marquese Chriss. [27] Miami Heat (2019) February 6, 2019, Anderson was traded to the Miami Heat in exchange for Wayne Ellington and Tyler Johnson. Anderson surrendered in the heat on July 6, 2019. [29] Returning to Houston (2019) September 27, 2019, Anderson signed with the Houston Rockets, [30][31][31], [31], but later on November 18, 2019, Anderson was recalled by the Houston Rockets.
