Welcome to Summit View Elementary School It is one of 13 elementary schools in the Waukesha school district. Summit View opened in the fall of 1992. It is the largest elementary school in the waukesha school district with a small community feel that we strive to know and improve each child's unique qualities. Summit View's physical structure gives students the best of all educational environments. Input to the design of the building was sought from educators, students and business leaders. There are seven teaching pods that house approximately 550 students in 3K to fifth. Within each pod there are options for individual as well as small and large group instruction. A central common area, surrounded by bookshelves and co-op spaces, opens out into four classrooms in each of the pods. Moving walls allow teachers to vary the learning environment. iPads are available for each students and staff include Chromebooks, data projectors, visual presenters, smart boards, green screens, mobile TV carts with Apple TV and Elmo projectors. Teaching at Summit View follows the rigorous curriculum of reading, writing and science in the Waukesha school district. Our teacher's instructional practices are enriched by their continued development in the fields of art integration, technology and personal learning. Setting the school, with its surrounding landscape and wooded areas, enhances this optimal learning environment and allows students to demonstrate their learning in different learning modalities. The staff at Summit View includes a number of teaching strategies and philosophies. Best practices such as Reader's and Writer's workshop are utilized. Using the District Response to Intervention (R.T.I.) model, interventions occur to provide additional support to students. Students are encouraged to develop independence, be creative and critical thinkers, appreciate and respect individual differences, and become effective problem solvers. We want all our students to become lifelong learners. Using a Professional Learning Community model, Summit View's employees collaborate to share ideas, analyze data, and plan lessons to help all students succeed. Open communication between home and school is essential. Parental input is one of the keys to student success. We are proud of Summit View and the children who participate in it. I'm a very involved parent and don't expect the school to do it all, but I basically got told when I asked the school to evaluate my son (via IDEA, IEP, 501 plan) that unless he doesn't have any additional help will be provided. No, they'd rather your child FAIL first (and thus decrease their self-esteem and of course when that happens, it's that much harder for your child to think they're smart and can succeed).
