The restaurant and tasting room are just part of the seven-acre Brutocao Cellars Schoolhouse Plaza, which was originally Hopland High School from 1922 to 1963. Historical photographs exhibited in the tasting room pay tribute to the school, which was transformed by Leonard Brutocao into a complex for wine and food. Special events are held here on a regular basis. The former gymnasium has been converted into the Bliss Hall, a banquet hall/conference centre for up to 200 guests. A popular spot for spring and summer weddings, as well as autumn and winter conferences, where the California Sustainable Winegrowing Alliance Conference was recently held by UC-Davis. The building now houses specialist shops and offices on the first floor, as well as two rooms for conferences and special events on the second floor. One of the biggest expenses for many middle-class families is the cost of schooling for their children. Many parents pay thousands of dollars each year to send their children to private schools-- especially those who live in areas where public schools are of poor quality. A 2014 comparison by the real estate site Trulia found that in postcodes with the highest rated public schools, only 4% of children attend private schools, compared to 19% of children in postcodes with poorly rated public schools. But that doesn't mean that parents who live in good school districts spend less overall. According to the Trulia study, homes in these high-performing school districts typically cost much more than other homes in the same area -- about 32% more. For many families, the extra cost of housing therefore adds up to more than what they would have paid for a private school. This means that parents who want the best possible education for their children have a difficult choice: to pay directly for private school or indirectly to pay for a house near a good public school. To find out what's best, they need to know how these two costs compare and what options they have to keep costs down. The cost of private school, according to figures from the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), about 4.5 million American children were enrolled in private schools between 2011 and 2012. More than 80% of these students were in schools with a kind of religious affiliation. Some 43% attended Catholic schools and another 37% attended schools identified as generally Christian, Jewish or a particular Christian denomination. Some 68% of all private schools have a religious orientation, while 32% are non-religious. On average, the cost of private school tuition for the 2011-2012 school year was '10,740 per child, according to the NCES. This is a considerable burden for a common family. In 2014, the median household income in the United States was .53,657, according to the United States Census Bureau. This means that a middle-income family would have to spend about 20% of their income to send only one child to a private school and 40% to two children. However, the cost of teaching varies considerably depending on the type of school. The median tuition cost was USD 6,890 per year for Catholic schools, USD 8,690 for other religious schools, and a whopping USD 21,510 for non-sectarian schools. A family with an average income would therefore pay less than 13% of their income in order to to a Catholic school, but more than 40% for a non-religious school. The cost of public school The cost of private school is easy to identify -- only a fixed number of dollars per year. Calculating the cost of public school ingesis is much more complicated. You need to know which neighborhoods parents choose for their schools, how much it costs live in these neighborhoods, and how these costs compared to the cost of living in other, nearby neighborhoods. A good starting point is with Niche, a website that evaluates and compares U.S. school districts based on factors such as test-rated students, graduation rates, health and safety ratings, and parental and student ratings. Each year, Niche lists the 10 school districts it rates as the best in America. For 2016, the Tredyffrin-Easttown School District is the first school district on The Niche. With a focus on Tredyffrin Township, Pennsylvania, a suburb of Philadelphia, this district receives A-plus ratings for academic achievement, teachers, extracurricular activities, and more. According to Trulia, the median sale price for homes in this area is .532,500. This add up to a monthly mortgage payment of about '2,610, based on a 30-year loan, a 20% down payment, and a 4% interest rate. For a buyer who can only afford a 10% deposit, the monthly payment jumps to 3,072 US dollars. In nearby Paoli, on the other hand, Trulia says that the average home price is only '287,000, or USD 1,407 per month. That's a difference of '14,436 per year -- about 34% more than the average cost of private schooling for a child. So a family with one child would spend less by living in Paoli and sending the child to a private school. However, a family with two or more children would spend less by living in Tredyffrin Township, where the extra money for housing would cover the cost of schooling for all their children. A 2014 article about school costs in Money comes to a similar conclusion. It compares the cost of private and public schools for two fictional families living in eastern Massachusetts: A family spends '2,120 per month on a house at a median price in the village of Auburndale, which has some of the best public schools in the country; the other spends '998 per month on a house in a neighborhood with average schools, plus an average of USD 782 per month for private school tuition. If these two costs are added together, the private school family will be able to move forward by 340 dollars per month. However, the math changes completely when both families have two children. In this case, the public school family will save a total of USD 70,000 over the course of the school year. Keeping school costs under control Generally, it seems that public schools are a better deal for families with multiple children, even in expensive neighborhoods, while private schools tend to be better off for children. However, this rule does not apply to everyone. Parents who choose the right private school can reduce tuition costs to an affordable level, even if several children are in school at the same time. Conversely, a wise decision about housing can make living in a great school district an affordable choice, even with just one child. Private school private school One way to make private school more affordable is to choose a school with less education. As mentioned earlier, religious schools -- especially Catholic ones -- tend to be much more affordable than non-sectarian private schools. Based on NCES figures, a family could send two children to a Catholic school for an average of USD 13,780 per year. That's a bit less than the extra USD 14,436 per year that it costs to live in Tredyffrin Township instead of Paoli. Another private school is a Montessori school. These schools take a pedagogical approach that focuses on letting children learn at their own pace, with all five senses. Most Montessori programs are for younger children, but some extend to early adolescence. According to a 2009 survey by the North American Montessori Teachers' Association, the cost of a year at Montessori school fluctuates sharply, but the median price for elementary school students is about .600 dollars. This makes Montessori schools more expensive than the typical Catholic school, but on a par with other religious schools. Parents can also save money by starting their children in a public primary school and then taking them to a private high school. According to the Money article, if their hypothetical private school family did so with two children, they would end up saving a total of 71,000 dollars compared to the family in the expensive school district. Private school scholarships Families who have difficulty affording private schooling can sometimes bring it into their financial reach through scholarships and other forms of financial support. Some schools have their own financial assistance programs, others participate in national, regional or government scholarship programs. Sources of funding include: the Children's Scholarship Fund. Originally created as the Washington Scholarship Fund, the Children's Scholarship Fund (CSF) now offers partial scholarships to low-income families across the country. Scholarships cover up to 75% of tuition costs, with an average amount of USD 1,700 per child. They can be used for any type of school -- religious, secular or even home. To qualify for scholarships, families must meet a child in elementary school and meet the income guidelines for the National School Lunch Program. In 2015-2016, the fund awarded scholarships to more than 24,000 students. To apply for a scholarship, parents must contact one of the CSF's partner programs in 16 countries. the time it takes for the process depends on the program. The Young Scholars Program. The By the Jack Kent Cooke The Young Scholars Program offers scholarships for middle and high school students with first-class grades. Every year, around 60 students receive scholarships, which they can use for boarding school, day school or parish (religious). Can. In addition to financial support, young students receive academic advice, access to special enrichment programs, and other resources. Families with incomes of up to USD 95,000 can apply, but most Young Scholars come from families with an income of less than USD 60,000. The application period runs from January to April, and students know until September whether they have qualified for an allowance. A better chance. This program is aimed at students of color in grades 4-9 who receive good overall grades and are active in extracurricular activities. The program does not actually provide scholarships, but it directs qualified students to more than 300 middle and high schools nationwide -- both religious and secular -- and helps them apply for financial support from those schools. A better chance says that most students who apply through their program receive financial support, but there is no specific percentage. The application process begins in February for the school year, which begins 18 months later. There are many other scholarship and school voucher programs operating in certain states or regions of the country. Parents can find out about programs in their area via the private school website. A house near the best public schools In general, neighborhoods with great public schools are more expensive than other neighborhoods in the same general area. However, there are some notable exceptions to this rule. Neighborhood Scout has compiled a list of neighborhoods in the country's 20 largest cities that combine good schools with affordable housing prices. For each neighborhood, the site lists the average home price and school district rating on a 100-point scale, based on factors such as class size and health test scores. You can enter your state and region into the website's advanced search engine and then set your criteria for Choose price and other features that are important to you, such as crime rates or walkability. However, to use this feature, you must subscribe to the website, which costs USD 40 per month, USD 90 per quarter, or USD 192 per year. Another way to afford a home in a first-class school district is to to live in a smaller house. In Tredyffrin Township, PA, for example, Zillow lists three-bedroom apartments for as little as USD 390,000. The mortgage payment for a house like this would be about '1,912 per month -- a saving of USD 698 per month, or USD 8,376 per year compared to the average house price. Final word When choosing a place of residence, the school district is not the only factor to consider. For starters, you want to find a house near your workplace, so you don't have to face a long commute every day -- possibly even one close enough to go to work on foot or by bike. Ideally, you would also like to be close to friends and family. Finally, you want to live in a neighborhood that's comfortable for you, with access to all the amenities you care about, from local businesses to a good public library. So if the neighborhood you like best isn't the one with the best schools, don't give it up. Instead, crunch some numbers and see how much you could save by combining an affordable home with a private school. Or, on the other hand, if the place you're in love with has a great school district and sky-high housing prices, look for ways to find an affordable home in that neighborhood.
