The people of Bannock County are served by a District Court. Each District Court contains a Division of Magistrates hearing trial matters, divorce proceedings, juvenile proceedings, initial proceedings through the preliminary hearing, criminal misdemeanours, infractions, civil cases when the disputed amount does not exceed \$10,000 and cases in the Small Claims Court that is set for disputes of \$5,000 or less. [1] The United States District Court for the District of Idaho has jurisdiction in Bannock County. Appeals from the Idaho District go to the United States Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit. Election rules Primary elections Supreme Court, appeals court and district judicial races are decided during the state's primary elections. However, if no candidate in a judicial race receives more than 50 percent of the vote in the primaries, the two candidates who received the highest number of votes advance to the general election, which functions as a kind of judicial election. [1] General elections If a race advances to the general election, but one of the candidates drops out of the race before then, the candidate who received the next highest number of votes in the primaries takes his place in the general election vote. In this situation, if there is a tie for third place in the primaries, the candidate to advance to the general election is chosen by much by the Secretary of State. [2] Note: In May 2012, the Idaho Republican Party switched to a closed primary system, which required voters to identify as Republicans before voting. Election withholding magistrates remain in favour of retention in the general election, which is being held in November. judges of the withholding application in August. Specifically, they must submit their nomination declaration no less than 90 days before the election. The vote includes the following language for this election: Will The County Magistrate \_\_ of the \_\_ Judicial District be retained in office? The population was 82,839 at the 2000 census. The county seat and largest city is Pocatello. [2] The county was established in 1893 and is named after the local Bannock tribe. [3] It is one of the counties with territories included in the Fort Hall Indian Reservation of the federally recognized Shoshone-Bannock tribes. Bannock County comprises the Pocatello, Idaho Metropolitan Statistical Area. Geography According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 1,147 square miles (2,970 km2), of which 1,112 square miles (2,880 km2) is land and 35 square miles (91 km2) (3.1%) is water. [4] The Portneuf River flows through the county, encountering the Snake River (the American Falls Reservoir) at the lowest point in the county, its northwestern corner. Bonneville Peak, on the eastern border of the Portneuf mountain range, is the highest point in the county at 2825 metres (8,800 ft) ASL; On its western slopes is the pebble creek ski resort. The population density was 26/km² (16.2 mi2). There were 29,102 homes with an average density of 26 per km². The county's racial makeup was 91.29% white, 0.59% black or African American, 2.91% Native American, 0.99% Asian, 0.16% Pacific islands, 2.08% from other races, and 1.98% from two or more races. 4.68% of the population were Hispanic or Latino of any race. 23.1% were English, 14.2% German, 11.1% American and 7.4% Irish. There are 27,192 families out of which 36.50% have children under the age of 18 living with them, 56.70% are married couples living together, 10.0% have a husbandless woman and 29.30% are non-families. 22.80% of all households are made up of individuals and 7.60% have a household in the same way. The average household death toll was 2.69 and the average family rate was 3.2. 28.10% of the population were under the age of 18, 14.60% from 18 to 24, 27.20% from 25 to 44, 20.0% from 45 to 64, and 10.10% who were 65 years of age or older. The median age was 30 years. For every 100 females, there were 97.7 males. For every 100 females age 18 or over, there were 94.4 males. The median household income was \$36,683, and the median family income was \$44,192. Males had a median income of \$36,056 while for females \$23,595. The per capita income for the cdp was \$17,148. About 9.80% of families and 13.90% of the population were below the poverty line, including 18.90% of those under age 18 and 12.80% of those age 65 or over. The population was 82,839 at the 2000 census, with 30,682 homes, and 20,836 families. The population density was 28.8/km² (18.8/mi²). There were 33,191 homes with an average density of 29.8 per km². [12] The county's racial makeup was 89.8% white, 3.2% Native American, 1.3% Asian, 0.8% black or African American, 0.2% Pacific Islands, 2.1% from other races, and 2.7% from two or more races. Those of Hispanic or Latin origin were 6.7% of the population. [11] In terms of ancestry, 23.4% were English, 16.9% were German, 9.3% were Irish, and 7.0% were Americans. There are 30,682 people living together in 35.5% of all families living with children under the age of 18 living with them, 52.2% are married couples living together, 10.7% have a female husbandless hotel, 32.1% are non-families and 24.9% of all homes. The average household death toll was 2.64 and the average family rate was 3.17. The median age was 31 years. [11] The median The median household income was \$44,848, and the median family income was \$54,650. Males had a median income of \$43,538 while for females \$28,870. The per capita income for the cdp was \$21,275. About 10.6% of families and 14.0% of the population were below the poverty line, including 20.0% of those under age 18 and 12.6% of those age 65 or over. [14] Government and Politics The last Democratic candidate for president to win the county was Lyndon B. Johnson in 1964,[15] although subsequent Republican victories have been by smaller margins than those in neighboring counties. Other elected officials include employee, treasurer, sheriff, adviser, coroner and prosecutor. [17] Like other counties in eastern Idaho, Bannock County has a significant Mormon population that tends strongly to vote Republican. However, a substantial union presence in the county - as well as the Idaho State University community - often gives Democrats an overall advantage, especially in local races. Bannock County routinely elects more Democrats than Republicans to county-level offices. At the state level, Bannock County is in legislative districts 28 and 29. [18] Democrats currently control two of those six seats in the Idaho Legislature. [19] In 2016, Republicans were able to win the Seat A House in District 29.
