[4] Namesake James Gamble jimmy nippert suffered a spotting wound in the final game of the 1923 season with state rivals Miami University. A month later, he died of septicaemia, allegedly because he had been infected with feces missing after a pre-match chicken contest. Nippert's grandfather, James Gamble of Procter & Camble, donated the necessary funds to complete the stadium. For the safety of the players, a dressing room and training (medical) facility were added as part of the refurbishment. [5] Nippert's older brother, Louis, owned the Cincinnati Reds in the 1970s. [6] Early history in 1895, the organizer of UC's first football team, Arch Carson, introduced a plan to build a stadium with wooden stands in the place where Nippert Stadium now stands. The first game played on the site originally called Varsity Field in Burnet Woods was on November 2, 1901, he defeated Hannover 10-0. Although Cincinnati has played home competitions at other Cincinnati parks, this side has been the primary home of Cincinnati Football ever since. The Nippert Stadium playing surface is called Carson Field in honor of Arch Carson Field in honor of Arch Carson Field began in 1900 and was completed in 1910. [7] In 1915, it was completed in the front parts of a brick and concrete structure to replace wooden stands, and continued for several seasons as the foundations were collected. In 1924, the completed building was dedicated to The James Gamble Nippert Memorial Stadium, with a capacity of 12,000 people. The field is slightly reversed from a traditional north-south trail, which is set from north-northeast to south-southwest at approximate altitudes of 245m above sea level. Timeline 1895 - UC Physical Education Director Arch Carson introduced a plan to build a stadium in Burnet Woods. 1901 - Cincinnati play its first game at Carson Field. A wall view was built on the surrounding hillside. 1909 – The lights were first used because a large number of students on the team could only practice at night. 1915 - Construction began with a permanent brick and concrete structure. 1923 - James Gamble donates \$250,000 in memory of his grandson, Jimmy Nippert, to finish the stadium. Jimmy Nippert, to finish the stadium is dedicated on November 8, with a seating capacity of 12,000 seats. 1936 - Carson Field is reduced by 3.7 meters to 24,000. 1954 - Reed Shank Pavilion is created along the eastern sidelines to increase capacity to 28,000. 1968 - Nippert was the first home of the AFL's expansion into Cincinnati Bengal, while the city built Riverfront Stadium, which opened in 1970. 1970 - AstroTurf replaces the natural grassy surface. 1989 - Nippert Stadium was closed for renovation and UC played home games at Riverfront Stadium in 1990. 1991 - Phase I of the stadium renovation is completed to allow UC's home games to be played. The Renovation II. 2000 - FieldTurf, a revolutionary grassy artificial surface, was installed. The former press box was named John and Dorothy Hermanies Press Box. 2001 - A new video scoreboard has been added in the northern end zone and provided new locker rooms at field level for game use. A new, larger video board and the FieldTurf game interface has been replaced. 2009 – 9,000 black padded seats were placed in the stadium's UCATS seats, replacing previously installed red plastic seat covers. 2013 - FieldTurf's playing surface was replaced by Act Global UBU and closed at the end of the 2013-14 season due to a Nippert renovation. 2014 - UC plays home games at the Cincinnati Bengals' home, Paul Brown Stadium, during a renovation of the stadium. 70yards to 115 yards for 75 yards for 75 yards for football and player safety, resulting in the loss of 1,200 seats. [12] Renovation history The area was reduced in 1936, reaching capacity of 24,000. In 1954, a small upper deck on the eastern sidelines was completed and named after the Reed Shank Pavilion. This increased its capacity to 28,000. In 1992, the stadium was heavily renovated, extending the upper deck of the east sideline and a new Press Box on the west sideline. This increased its capacity to 35 097. In 2005, new gameday locker rooms behind the north end zone (underneath the newly completed Campus Rec Center) were expanded, along with a new larger video board above the north end zone. Renovation and expansion 2014-2015 In the late 2000s, the UC programme came to the fore, with Nippert's small seating capacity becoming a problem. Former UC head coach Brian Kelly has called for the expansion of Nippert, the smallest stadium in the Big East Conference. On December 18, 2012, President Santa J. Ono and then Athletic Director Whit Babcock unveiled long-awaited plans to upgrade and expand Nippert Stadium. Originally, the price tag was estimated at \$70 million,[13] but a budget of \$86 million was eventually announced. On June 25, 2013, the Board of Trustees of the University of Cincinnati approved the expansion of Nippert Stadium. The West Pavilion now includes a new press box and premium seating area, which will add suites, loge boxes, and club seating. The western lobby also boasts better overall fan comfort. including concession stands, restrooms, and more efficient stadium traffic. On the east side of the stadium, the additions were rare, but included additional concession stands, restrooms and the expansion of previously cramped lobby pavements as Herschede-Shank Pavilion was linked to the O'Varsity Way brick plázia, which in front of the stadium. Nippert will host FC Cincinnati's match in 2017 after expanding the area after renovations, Nippert's capacity (including about 2,500 SRO) is now about 40,000 (an exact figure not yet submitted by the university). However, local United Soccer League club FC Cincinnati sold Nippert Stadium in July 2016 after renovations and announced a crowd of 35,061. [14] In early 2017, Nippert lost 1,200 seats in a \$2 million project that expanded a 5-meter-long and wide playing field to accommodate a full-size football field. [15] The 2014-2015 renovation and expansion was designed by Architecture Research Office, based in New York, in close cooperation with Heery International. The ARO was the design architect, while Heery served as a sports consultant and senior architect. [16] The expansion of the Nippert Stadium began in December 2015. [17] During the 2014 season, the Bearcats played every home game at Paul Brown Stadium, the downtown home of the Cincinnati Bengals. On October 24, 2015, the Bearcats hosted the UConn Huskies on homecoming weekend. The crowd is on hand at 40,124 making it the second consecutive official sale at the recently renovated Nippert Stadium. The Bearcats were winning in front of 7 of the 10 biggest crowds in the Nippert including the top 3 games attended. One national columnist who visited the sold-out Barrel Nails rivalry game in 2013 described Nippert Stadium as a strange bowl of angry noise that sits under the gaze of remarkable architecture and compared it to baby Death Valley (referring to LSU's notoriously intimidating Tiger Stadium). [23] In 2012, USA Today named Nippert Stadium hosted the Cincinnati Bengals, an expanding American Football League at Nippert in 1973. [25] The stadium was a concert venue at least three times. On July 22, 1973, Edgar Winter Group attracted between 5,000 and 7,000 fans of The James Gang and Peter Frampton's Camel. On July 29, 1973, the Grand Funk Railroad concert attracted only 8,000 fans. Seventeen were arrested on charges of getting in without a ticket. On August 3, 1975, Nippert hosted the Ohio River Rock Festival in Aerosmith, Black Oak Arkansas, Öyster Cult, Foghat, Mahogany Rush, Rush, Dirt Band, REO Speedwagon, and Styx; the recording was a festival meeting/general recording, with 32,000 viewers according to local radio broadcasts). On June 15, 1973, the Grateful Dead were due to perform at Nippert, but the show was canceled, according to the Cincinnati Post, as the station was not in accordance with the demands of the Dead (they eventually played Cincinnati Gardens on December 4, 1973).) On November 2, 2008, Democratic presidential candidate Barack Obama held a rally in Nippert two days before the election with an estimated 27,000 attendees. [28] FC Cincinnati started playing for Nippert in 2016. On September 16, 2017, the team broke the United Soccer League regular-season record and brought in 30,417 fans for the game against the New York Red Bulls II. On October 2, 2016, 30,187 were pulled into the playoffs against the Charleston Battery. On September 29, 2018, the USL attendance record was broken again, with 31,478 fans drawn against the PCC's final regular-season game before the team signed for MLS. On 16 July 2016, they drew 35,061 in a friendly against Crystal Palace F.C. On April 15, 2017, they attracted a USL record 23,144 home opening audience against the New York Red Bulls. On June 23, 2018, Nitro Circus performed at Nippert. [29] Alternative Stadiums UC used Paul Brown Stadium, home of the NFL's Cincinnati Bengals, as an alternative home field for several high-profile home games. The downtown stadium can accommodate up to 65,535 people. Games against Ohio State (2002), Oklahoma (2010) and West Virginia (2011) drew crowds of 66,319, 58,253 and 48,152 at Paul Brown Stadium.
