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December 16. 1992 U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Medical Surgical Nurses are registered nurses who care for adult patients in hospitals, home health centers, standalone clinics and other health environments. Medical-surgical nursing is the basis of all nursing specialties, and is considered a specialty for itself, according to the Academy of Medical-Surgical Nurses. Registered nurses who meet minimum standards established by an independent credenied organization such as the American Nurses Credentialing Center can be certified in the medical-surgical nurse specialty. Some research suggests that certified medical surgical nurses earn higher salaries than their non-certified counterparts. All medical-surgical nurses are eligible to work in medical-surgical environments. The national average hourly wage for registered nurses regardless of whether they are certified in a specialty field of nursing was \$33.23 as of May 2011, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The top 10 percent earned \$21.62 or less. A certified medical-surgical nurse's salary varies based on the region of the country where he or she practices, according to the 2011 ADVANCE for Nurses payroll survey. Certified medical-surgical nurses in the Northeast region earned hourly wages of \$49.04 while they are mid-Atlantic and the Lower Great Lakes region earned \$37.41 per hour. The average hourly wage of those who practiced in the Southeast was \$35.01 while those in the Midwest earned \$43.27 per hour. Certified medical-surgical nurses in the West earned an average salary of \$44.80 per hour. Non-certified medical-surgical nurses tended to earn lower salaries than those who had certification, according to the 2011 ADVANCE for Nurses payroll survey. Non-certified medical-surgical nurses in the Northeast region earned \$30.89 per hour. The average hourly wage of those practicing in the Southeast was \$29.02 while those in the Midwest earned \$27.77 per hour. Non-certified medical-surgical nurses in the West earned an average salary of \$40.25 per hour. The healthcare sector is one of the fastest growing industries in the largest occupation in the healthcare sector. When considered an entry-level nursing job, medical-surgical nursing today is an important specialty due to advances in the medical field. Medical-surgical nurses must handle the care of adult patients of all ages with acute and chronic conditions, whether they are surgical patients with a variety of diagnoses. For example, a patient waiting for an appendectomy may also be undergoing treatment for a heart disease and Crohn's disease. Medical-surgical nurses must be able to coordinate, organize and prioritize complex multiple patient assignments; guide patient care; use current research to provide care for various needs; and use nursing best practice in various situations. They need to understand the complex differences in medications and how they interact with each other in patients' systems. They must also be comfortable learning new technology. As with all RNs, a medical-surgical nurse may have patients discharged and new ones added to her care throughout the shift. They must be prepared for rapid changes in their daily routines. Medical-surgical nursing presents many challenges and variety, which spurs the development of management, organizational and time management skills and knowledge of a wide range of nursing procedures, from basic to advanced. These skills can be easily applied in another nursing specialty or medical role. Medical-surgical nurses must have an associate degree or a bachelor's degree in nursing and be registered nurses, or RNs. During training, nursing students should take courses in medical-surgical nursing. Oh, Oh, i'm not RN, they must pass the National Council Licensure Examination, known as NCLEX-RN. Each state and the District of Columbia also require nurses to be licensed before they can work. After working two years as RN - or with 2,000 hours of practice over the past three years in a medical-surgical setting - nurses can be certified in specialty by passing the Certified Medical-Surgical Registered Nurse exam. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts that the employment of registered nurses, will increase 19 percent from 2012 to 2022, faster than the average for all occupations. The outlook for medical-surgical nurses should be good, as factors for this job growth are attributed to areas where medical-surgical nurses are used. These areas include an expected increase in the use of long-term care, outpatient centres, home health services and ambulatory care centres. RNs with at least a bachelor's degree in nursing will have stronger employment prospects, says BLS. According to the Campaign for Nursing's Future, medical-surgical nurses make an average annual salary of \$57,000 to \$62,000. BLS reports that in 2012 registered nurses as a whole earned mean annual earnings of \$67,930. Registered nurses earned a median annual salary of \$68,450 in 2016, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, At the low end, registered nurses earned a 25. The 75th percent salary is \$83,770, which means 25 percent earn more. In 2016, 2,955,200 people were employed in the United States as registered nurses. Nurses,

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
