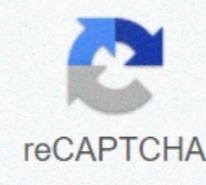




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Cherokee iowa news

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Iowa's intestacy law gives your property to your closest relatives, starting with your spouse and children. If you have neither a spouse nor children, your grandchildren or your parents will receive your property. This list continues with increasingly distant relatives, including siblings, grandparents, aunts and uncles, cousins, and your husband's relatives. If the court exhausts this list to find that you have no living relatives through blood or marriage, the state will take your property. Do I need a lawyer to do a will in Iowa? Should I use my willingness to name an executor? Yes. In Iowa, you can use your will to name an executor who will make sure that in your will is performed after your death. If you don't name an executor, the probate court will appoint someone to take on the job of winding up your property. Can I revoke or change my will? In Iowa, you can revoke or change your will at any time. You can revoke your will by: burning, tearing, interrupting, wiping out or destroying your will with the intention of revoking it instructing someone else to burn, tear, interrupt, obliterate or destroy your will in front of you, or make a new will that says it recalls the old one or that has conflicting conditions of the old will. If you and your spouse divorce (or if a court determines that your marriage is not legal), Iowa law revokes any language of your will that leaves property to your spouse or names your spouse to be your executor. But if you happen to remarry your ex, then these rules will not apply. If you have any questions about the effects of divorce on your will, see a property planning lawyer for help. If you need to make changes to your will, it is best to revoke it and make a new one. However, if you have only very simple changes to make, you can add an amendment to your existing will – this is called a codicil. In either case, you need to complete your changes with the same formalities that you used to make your original will (see above). According to the Cherokee Museum, traditional Cherokee clothing began to change in the late 18th century when Cherokee people began adopting the fabrics and styles of their white neighbors. Earlier in the century, men usually wore traded cotton shirts, leggings, loincloths, moccasins and a woven or beaded belt. Several piercings around the edge of the ear were common, as were feathers tied at the top of the head. Cherokee women wore feather or leather mantles and skirts and pierced lobes in their ears. Cherokee.org explains that strip shirts and toes dresses are believed to have come into fashion around the time of the Trail of Tears in the 1830s. Tower bolts of calico material are used to make dresses, which are usually floor-length and decorated with appliqué diamond patterns, triangles, circles or the sacred seven-sided Cherokee star. The band shirt is made of the same material and features appliqué ribbons, as the name suggests. Men sometimes wear the shirt with a traditional calico turban. Woven belts and corn beads may decorate the garments. Numbers play an important role in the Cherokee tradition, especially the numbers four and seven. The natural world dominates much of their cultural belief system. Animals, trees, sky and earth are all integrated into these beliefs. The circle is a symbol found in many Cherokee ceremonies and myths. The traditional Stomp Dance is performed in a circular motion and fires are built so wood burns in a circular pattern. Rivers and streams are considered sacred. Walking in the water is believed to be a method of purification. The Cherokee believes that the spirits of the dead can sometimes be seen. Seen.

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
