



**Compton college nursing spring 2020** 

Prospectue nursing students must complete the following steps to obtain an application for admission: Apply for admission to college new students absent for two consecutive basic terms (autumn or spring semesters; excluding summer and winter dates) must complete an online application for admission. You must have a Compton College Student ID number that must provide official high school transcripts or a General Equivalency Diploma (GED) or graduated with a co-worker (AA or AS) or a higher degree to a Compton College nursing advisor when applying for admission to a nursing program. The transmission of official transcripts from all accredited colleges and vocational schools they have attended must be on file with the Admissions and Registration Office. Take part in an information session within one year of your application for admission. Information sessions are held in the autumn or spring semesters. During these sessions, you will be provided with information about the requirements for entering and/or updating the program. Provide proof of validity of your social security number or tax identification. Candidates must bring an official social security institution or tax ID card for a nursing advisor to verify during an advisory visit. Complete NURS 144 (formerly N48) Dosage Calculations and NURS143 (formerly N145) Introduction to nursing with C or better. Complete medical terminology 1 or equivalent and Psychology 16 or equivalent to C or better. All students applying for admission to the nursing program are required to take the readiness assessment test, which is the ATI Basic Academic Skills Test (TEAS) exam. The program will invite the student to the exam after the application is submitted. Application period: The nursing programme accepts applications twice a year, starting from the third week of the autumn/spring semester over a three-week period. Applicants interested in applying for admission must obtain an Eligibility Verification package from a nursing advisor. The Eligibility Verification package and completed applications for admission must be submitted to the nursing department within a specified application period. Eligibility and application are not accepted on weekends or public holidays. No late or misspelled forms are accepted. The Commission will only unpack completed proposals. The deadline for submission of applications for autumn 2020 has been closed. The deadline for submission of applications for autumn 2020 is to start on Monday, 14 September 2020 and end on Friday, 2 October 2020 at noon. Students interested in applying for an Associate Degree in nursing must make an appointment with a nursing advisor to obtain a form verifying the eligibility to apply for admission. The Associate Degree Nursing program provides the student with the ability to use the nursing process and assess the unique needs of the patient throughout his or her life with a concept-based approach to learning. The competence of the degree will be regularly assessed by assessing the expected learning outcomes in clinical settings, as well as the study of the course. Emphasis is placed on the use of critical thinking and creative problem solving in clinical settings. Primary nursing prepares graduates in various healthcare institutions as registered nurses at the primary level. After successful completion of the nursing program, the graduate is entitled to take the NCLEX-RN (National Council Licensure Examination for registered nurses). The evaluation of the programme is carried out by monitoring the success rates of students in the NCLEX-RN exam. If a potential student receives a score below the recommended score, the student will be required to complete the repair and then reuse ATI TEAS. Graduate from high school or get a passing score on a General Equivalency Diploma (GED) or earned an associate (AA) or higher degree. Take part in an information session: These sessions are intended for students who are close or ready to apply. Participation in a nursing information session within 1 year of application is a requirement to apply to the Compton College Associate Nursing Degree Nursing advisor and get an Eligibility Verification Package Completed N144 (N48) Dosage Calculations and N143 (N145) Introduction and Preparation for Nursing (General Student Only) at Compton College Provide proof of a valid social security number or tax identification to a nursing counselor before receiving a verification of eligibility records for consideration of admission to the nursing program. To receive your application, you must submit the Eligibility Verification package to the Nursing Department The application period for spring 2021 starts on Monday, 14 September 2020. Entries will be accepted from Monday to Thursday from 10:00 to 16:00. Friday from 9:30 am to noon. Applications are obtained

from the nursing department when a person has been deemed eligible for admission and receives a Certificate Verification package from a nursing counsellor. Entries will not be accepted on weekends and public holidays. No delayed or incorrectly directed forms will be accepted. Only complete applications will be processed. Once a student is admitted to the nursing program, there will be deadlines for formalities and tests that will have to be met in order to be cleared to register for classes. ADMISSIONS ASSESSMENT (START STUDYING TODAY) Before admission, potential candidates are required to take and pass a readiness assessment test. The readiness assessment test at Compton College is a basic academic skills test (TEAS) test. This diagnostic test covers basic math, English, reading and learning in addition to meeting prerequisites. Potential candidates will be invited to take the TEAS exam. For more information about the TEAS test, or to purchase a test guide, log in to . The TEAS V test has been replaced by ati teas vi. The nursing program will no longer accept TEAS Version V as a readiness assessment test. All potential candidates will have to pass the ATI TEAS VI exam. ATI TEAS, released on August 31, 2016, will allow you to use the four-function calculator. Please do not bring calculator is at the ONLINE version of the ATI TEAS exam. Persons scheduled to take a TEAS test must present a government-issued ID (California Driver's License, California identification Card, or United States Passport) with the current photograph, the examiner's signature, and the exam. The following exam information will be confirmed before testing: Exact name match. First name, second place initial (if applicable), last name, spelling matches government-issued ID. Verified a positive match to the current photo of the presented ID. Students requiring Special Rooms will need to obtain supporting documentation from Special Resource Services. Supporting documentation must be submitted to the Nursing Department's office when applying for admission. TRANSFER TRANSFER TRANSFER TRANSFER TRANSFER TRANSFER STUDENTS ARE CONSIDERED STUDENTS WHO HAVE BEEN IN ANOTHER NURSING PROGRAM. A loan for nursing courses completed at another college will be assessed individually by the nursing director or head. Credit can also be achieved in the petitions process. Students interested in applying for admission to compton college's affiliated nursing degree program as a transfer student will not be accepted after the second semester. Students interested in moving to Compton College must meet all admission criteria to be eligible for the nursing program. Potential candidates will have to apply for admission, Transfer and Progression Commission (ATP) will assess your application to determine eligibility. Potential candidates must have completed an N48 dosage calculation course at Compton College to be eligible for admission. In addition, you must participate in an information session within 1 year of attempting to transfer to Compton College ADN. Transfer students are admitted to a nursing program based on space availability. The Director of Nursing will be responsible for evaluating the semester in which you will be accepted into the program. Once the ATP appeal request has been approved, eligible persons approved for admission will have to enroll and complete NURSE 149 - Advanced nursing placements with C or better, before moving to the semester in which the candidates were approved. RE-ENTRY STUDENTS Students must apply for re-admission to the nursing program within one (1) year from the date of departure. A student who is not present in the program for more than one (1) year will be considered inactive and placed in inactive. In order to return to active status, the student must successfully complete the course. A competency review will be given in the skills lab. If the student does not review the skills competence, they may decide to repeat the last course. A clinical assessment may also be required for students returning or moving to a medical surgical course. In addition to handing over the competency review, the student must perform any individualised remedies that have been prescribed by the instructor or nursing department. The recommended reclamation will be based on the needs of the student identified by both the student and the instructor. The instructor will then offer the program director a corrective action plan for the student. student before applying for rejoiding the nursing program. Proof of successful completion of the repair will be needed before readmission to the program. Students who stop-out will have priority re-entry over students who drop out. Re-entry will be available based on space. APPEALS A student must apply for readmission within one (1) year of the semester he/she has withdrawn. If a student had to withdraw due to unsatisfactory theory or clinical competence, the prescribed remedies will be based on the identified needs of the student. The faculty involved will propose a clinical student reclamation plan. Before applying for rejoiding the nursing program, the student must complete certain individual classes. Proof of successful completion of the required before readmission to the program. Students who stop-out will have priority re-entry over students who drop out. Re-entry will be available based on space. The time limit for lodging an appeal is 13 October 2020 and 10 November 2020.
