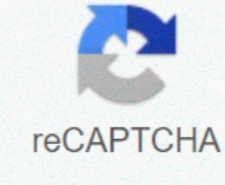

When you meet privately with a school counsel, your conversation will most likely be confidential. Mentors won't go blabbing your business around school. However, different schools have different policies. So talk directly to your adviser about what they consider to be secrets. In very rare cases, an adviser cannot keep the information confidential. An adviser who thinks someone is at risk of harm is required by law to share that information. Even in these rare cases, the advisor will only share that information with people who need to know. Sometimes people worry that other students will think they are having mentoring because they have big problems or they are in trouble. But in most schools, mentoring issues address a lot of the school's problems - as well as personal issues. So you can meet for career advice or advice on which classes to take for college. Your friends and classmates don't need to know why you're seeing a mentor unless you choose to tell them. Your school advisor is someone who is separate from your life - a neutral adult who is not a parent, relative or teacher. Your school advisor is not a therapist. (So if you see your mentor, it's not like getting treatment.) If you need help in a way that a school counseling can't provide, they can give you information about other resources, such as a therapist's name. No matter what yours, try to think of the adviser as someone who is at your side. Even if you've had a bad experience in the past with a mentor or a private therapist, don't hesitate to contact your school counseling - or talk to the counseling office about meeting someone else if you don't click with your current mentor. Each adviser is different, and most understand that it is natural for people to be more comfortable with some individuals than others. Don't be surprised if your parents know your school counseling. They can even get in touch with each other. Sometimes mentors provide workshops to parents, with or without their children, on topics such as learning skills or preventing drug abuse. It's good for your mentors and parents to know each other when everything is going OK. If you're seeing your adviser and your parents don't know about it, don't worry that the advisers will talk to them about your meetings. Unless you have given the adviser the feeling that you can harm yourself or others, what was said in your meetings will stay only between you and the adviser. School counseling is all about helping to make your school experience as good as possible. The role of school counseling today is very different from the role of like when your parents were at school. Instead of just focusing on school and career homework, today's mentors are there for students in a broader way. They help students deal with almost any problems they may have in how they study, guide them to the future effectively, and strive to create a positive environment for everyone at school. They are good listeners, and they want to help you get the most out of school. School counseling helps students handle all kinds of problems. For example, they can help if a child is: being bullied at school struggling in maths and needing extra help new to school and no friends yet upset about a family problem, such as divorce or the death of a troubled relative focusing on homework there are friendship troubles that feel anxious about what to expect wait next year in high school If you are going through any kind of problem, a great person to share your thoughts and feelings with is your school mentor. How do I see my school counseling? It's a good idea to know school advisors, even if you don't need any help right now. Some school mentors come to class to teach lessons about emotions, learning skills, friendship skills, standing up for themselves, or dealing with bullying. Students can also meet privately with their school counsel in the counseling office. Some mentors have special group meetings for children, all dealing with the same problem - such as divorce in their family, or a dead relative. If you would like to speak privately with your counsel, ask your teacher, parents, or someone who works in the school office. Private high school mentors also use student tests and scores to assess their skills and determine the best career for them. Some even help seniors get financial support or apply to their favorite colleges. These professional advisors earn relatively average salaries compared to most professions. Private high school advisers earned an average annual salary of \$40,000 as of 2013, according to employment website Simply Hired. Most of these mentors have a Master's degree in school counseling. Employers also prefer to recruit people who have at least some focus on career development. All private high school counseling must also be licensed in their state by taking a written exam through the Certified National Advisory Council, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Other key requirements include compassion, attention to detail and communication, organization, organization, and computer skills. In 2013, average salaries for private high school advisers changed dramatically in some parts of the United States. In the Southern region, they earn the highest salary of \$63,000 in Washington, D.C., and as low as \$31,000 in Mississippi, according to Simply Hired. Those in the Northeast make between \$36,000 and \$48,000 per year, respectively, in Maine and Massachusetts. These high school advisers earn \$31,000 to \$42,000 in the Midwest, with the lowest salaries in South Dakota and the highest in Illinois and Minnesota. In the West, they earn the least in Montana and the most in Alaska and California - \$32,000 and \$45,000, respectively. (See references 8-10 and resources 1) Private high school advisers earn more in Minnesota and Washington, D.C., because of the high cost of living. For example, a person earning \$40,000 in Des Moines would need to earn \$48,508 per year in Minneapolis to maintain the same living sistance. In Washington, D.C., the same individual in Des Moines will have to earn \$62,850 annually. The size of the school can also affect the salaries of private high school advisers, as larger schools often have larger budgets for higher pay. The BLS forecasts a 19 percent increase in employment for school and career advisers, including those working in private high schools, according to statistics on average compared to all professions. Increased enrollment in both public and private schools will drive demand for these professionals. Private school enrollment also tends to increase when high schools do not meet state education standards. Parents then enroll their children in private schools to improve their education, which could increase employment for private high school advisers. School and career advisers earned an average annual salary of \$54,560 in 2016, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. At the low end, schools and career counseling earn a 25th percentual salary of \$41,650, which means 75 percent earn more than this amount. The 75th percentual salary is \$70,930, which means 25 percent earn more. In 2016, 291,700 people were employed in the United States as school and career advisors. The responsibility of a school counsel, contrary to popular belief, extends beyond just processing college applications. In addition to ensuring that students' college application forms are in order, the university's advisory responsibilities also include adjusting the personal development schedules and habits that students need to go in the right direction. Course optimization counseling In the preparation for their university career, students will often need advice on what courses to take before they begin their university program.
