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## Callaway big bertha hybrid adjustment guide

With a strong launch, the Callaway Big Bertha hybrid 2019 is long and forgiving. Add great adjustments and looks and this hybrid will definitely be the leader of the SGI category. Introduction Slipping from the sleek headgear of the Big Bertha 2019 hybrid, the first thing that caught my attention was Jailbreak Technology – a proven design and perhaps my favorite name. Then I noticed the adjustments and thought to myself all this in the SGI hybrid. And once again I was impressed with how Callaway incorporates technology across its lines. Looking at the address, Big Bertha is almost identical to the Rouge X hybrid. The black and smoky gray biseksi around the center gives the hybrid a distinctive profile. The silver/shiny grey ZT9 Recoil shaft is the perfect match. In the bag, the club has a clean, upscale presence. Sound && Feel There's no big difference heard all over Big Bertha's hybrid face, but when you catch one centralized you know it. The sound is crisp, and both in the middle of the field and mid-volume. Similarly, the centered strike feels pure and there is moderate feedback through the hands on mishits. With Big Bertha's hybrid offset, it took a few swings to find the right ball position for a solid ball attack - a good reminder to give the new club a chance. After that I launched the ball easily on a high and strong trajectory. The smash factor is consistently above 1.4 – even on mishits. This club is very forgiving. Strong performance can be attributed to two design aspects of the big bertha hybrid 2019. The first is Jailbreak Technology. The circle you see in the only one is the tip of the rod connected to the crown - it thickens the body and retains more impact energy in the face. The second is the face itself, the ultra-thin Carpenter 455 which, combined with Callaway's Hyper Speed Face Cup, produces faster ball speed. The new OptiFit hosel customization system is shorter and lighter than previous Callaway offerings that have allowed designers to reposition heavy savings to optimize the C.O.G. The instruction cards that come with the club are easy to understand, but for the brush effect actually read the first part of this classic - How to Customize Your Driver. In stock, neutral settings, hybrids are drawn bias - that is, the flight of slices. I tried some attic arrangements and lies, and the results of the ball flight were well known and precise and all directed to help a further piece. My conclusion is amazed at how much callaway technology can squeeze into one reasonable-sized hybrid. The result is a hybrid with strong performance, great forgiveness, and Oh, and an impressive performance. All that reason may be why Callaway decided to offer the 2019 Big Bertha hybrid in six sizes – from 18° 3H to 33° 8H. Although the hybrid is directed to a middle-to-high handicap golfer, he has the playing ability desired by better golfers. Doug, one of the fitter at club champion in Orlando, summed it up nicely after trying a variety of shots: This club does whatever you want. End In 2014, Callaway Golf came out with a Big Bertha hybrid that is familiar with the name but carries something that no other Callaway hybrid has ever used. That's right, although it looks like they've been around forever, 2014 was the first time Callaway had ever been brought to customizable hybrids. It was a new and exciting venture for them which meant golfers, for the first time, could play around with the same attic adjustments they get from their favourite Callaway drivers and the forest fairway. Fast forward to earlier this year when Callaway introduced the Rogue hybrid. This marks the first time the company has included Jailbreak Technology in such a club. For those who do not know, Jailbreak Technology consists of two vertical blades behind the clubface, which helps sniff the chassis. With this design, more energy will be transferred from the face on impact. During the THP review process with the Rogue line, the speed of the ball and the distance the hybrid produces are undoubtedly on the strong side. The hybrid performance provided was great so it stayed in the bag for the whole season, which for me, was quite an achievement. Even with Jailbreak being part of the equation, there is one piece of technology that Callaway has used in the past that feels nothing, and that, as one might have guessed, is finding a way to insert customizable hosel. Over the years Callaway has used the same customizable hosel, one that allows golfers to set up square clubs or in draw positions as well as four different loft options. It has been in and out of their hybrid designs over the last few releases, and it's making a return in the latest Big Bertha. However, to be able to produce a hybrid containing Jailbreak and adjustment means something has to change. Realizing this, Callaway took steps to update their OptiFit Hosel by making it shorter and lighter. When I say lighter, we're talking about storing 13 grams of that area that allows for a successful marriage of these two technologies. With today's materials, the R&D team struggling to save every possible gram, therefore saving 13 grams is a big deal. Not only does it help save weight, but it also looks much cleaner than the previously customizable hybrid callaway has used. This version of the Big Bertha Hybrid carries a fairly familiar form for those who have experienced callaway hybrids in recent years. The leg area is still raised and squared, although not as much as Rogue, which to me helps give the feeling that there are a lot of faces behind the golf ball, making it very user-friendly. When compared to the Rogue hybrid, which also incorporates jailbreak technology, Big Bertha offers a chunkier profile, which can help give golfers confidence as they transition from fairway metal to hybrid. There are also slightly more offsets present, which will get that ball in the air but it can also be an eyesore for some people. Today's market gives consumers the ability to take hybrids that can play as an actual iron substitute, a pure distance club, or something in the middle. Even in callaway callaway ranks Decisions may come down between Apex, Big Bertha, or Rogue. Make no mistake about it; This Big Bertha hybrid takes a dead goal at golfers who are looking for extra forgiveness while being able to launch it high and take some extra distance. For my own game, I'm always looking for hybrids that will reach a certain number for me and do it regularly. Hybrids have become a club that sometimes I can lean on because of the predictions they can offer. This whole package may not be something that will instantly appear on my radar, but after spending some time with it, it is one worth considering. Prediction is something I crave from this ilk club, and it is something I experienced during testing. First with the flight of the ball, it is easy to get the ball in the air, which is necessary when hitting a long approach shot. I'm not a low-ball hitter, but there are times with Rogue where I hope I don't hit a straight bullet, and with this, I can achieve more consistency in the heights department. When looking at the data of this club versus some of the other hybrids that I have had the opportunity to play in the last year, this one certainly stands out in this. Finding a club that gives repeated ball flight is one thing, seeing one that reaches the required page mark is another. Rogue is a hybrid looking distance, and this one doesn't bend well. During testing the Big Bertha hybrid is set to play at 22 degrees, which is 1 degree weaker than the stock attic. Being able to hit this attic in the 200-yard range meant that he got a number for me that I would normally equate to a modern day three hybrid, or while living in a Callaway family, a heavenwood. Because I'm not a long hitter, finding a club that reaches a certain number, and doing it in a more repetitive way gives the club the most likely to stay in the bag. Recently the shots were recorded with the help of the Foresight GC2, and the data shows that this club is indeed a pretty solid player. Ball speed is consistently around 130 MPH, which is a credit to Ultra-Thin Face and Jailbreak Technology. Callaway says that this should spin a little more than Rogue, and even with a few misses in this data, the spin number is in a pretty comfortable range for me. The height of the summit indicates that this club is doing what it is made to do, achieving higher flight, which can help the ball land a little softer on the green. Overall, the performance is quite impressive and that should garner a serious look by anyone in need of a forgiving hybrid. Callaway offers big bertha hybrid from 3-hybrid to When taking into account the customizable attic, it means players should easily be able to find attics that will work for them as the range changes from 17 to 35. Golfer Golfers Like me, looking for a hybrid to hit a particular page will no doubt have a lot of options with this club to find the perfect setting. Someone who stays away from the driving iron, but wants a fairway finder might consider playing it at 17 or 18 degrees because it will be easy to hit, give it a lot of speed, and add some extra forgiveness. Currently, the Big Bertha hybrid is available for pre-order at \$269, with an expected delivery date in January.
