Is it a black color? Is it a white color? The answer to both of these questions depends on your point of view. Ask a scientist or physicist, they give you a completely different answer from an artist, a chemist, even a child with a box of crayons. No one is completely right or completely wrong, because how we define the word color is completely subjective. Like many words in the English language, it has multiple meanings and depends on the whole context. Talk about a colorful discussion! Just as our taste buds interpret molecules as different flavors for our brain, our eyes can translate different parts of the light spectrum into colors we see. Red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indisise and purple are pure rainbow or light spectrum colors. It's the absence of black light -- it actually absorbs light wavelengths, and therefore it's not a color because it's the absence of any color. White, on the other hand, means the presence of all colors on the visible light spectrum. Because it is a mixture of all wavelengths of light, some advocate that white is not a real color another. Gray is considered an intermediate color between black and white. But it's an acromatic color, which means it's a colorless color because it doesn't reflect any color wavelengths like blue, red or green. Not everyone is allowed to use it. And since 2011, Black Mirror has presented the most important themes of this series to take on a tech enthusiast, futuristic: paranoia, isolation, and the pursuit of identity. Charlie Brooker's series has played for two seasons, each containing three episodes plus a Christmas special on Britain's Channel 4. In 2015, Netflix ordered six more episodes, which premiered on the streaming platform on October 21, 2016. Black Mirror has received rave reviews from critics for its cynical and often disturbing review of methods of using and lying off digital devices, often offering alternative versions of reality that our technology can use and nye us with. There are at least one or two moments in each episode when most people stop and say, We're going to have to go back to the 21st century. But there is a cut on some rest - disturbing, thought-provoking, and completely memorable television emotional resonance episode. Here are six must-see episodes of Black Mirror'S National Anthem I If there's one thing we can learn from the Channel 4 2016 election cycle - the Brexit news and other political turmoil abroad - it's that our politicians are extremely flawed, even at their best. In the first episode of Black Mirror, we have a chance to imagine how some extremely difficult decisions can be made and made in the upper echelons of power, and how big the consequences can be for both those responsible and those who serve. National Anthem Prime Minister Callow (Rory Kinnear), mild-mannered tracks Britain's leader is in the not too distant future. When a member of the royal family is kidnapped and held for ransom, he wants to do his patriotic duty to break in from his captors and release him. Unfortunately, that means getting close to a pig on live TV. The episode changes their perspective as Callow and his team desperately try to find another way to save the princess, and the nation finally watches in amazement to see if she can actually do it. As a commentary on political scandal and the worldwide fixation of the brutality of the 24hour news cycle, the National Anthem is both apt and brutal. It's also black mirror's most realistic episode to date - and in some ways it feels like it can be easily ripped from today's headlines. 2. You All Date Black Mirror'S All History | Channel 4 Memory is valuable. Addressing the moments that shape us is vital to help us understand not only our lives, but also the world around us. But in Black Mirror's The Entire History of You, we see the terrible consequences of living in the recent past. Liam (Toby Kebbell) is insecure when it comes to his personal and professional life. As a result, he often uses his grain - a state-of-the-art microchip embedded in his brain that allows him to play back memories and repeatedly study key moments. It causes turmoil or another in her marriage to Fiona (Jodie Whittaker) and the growing sense of unease that she has missed some important signals about the title aspect of her life. Backed by tremendous performances by Kebbell and Whittaker, The Entire History of You gives a not-so-subtle, yet poignant critique of our tendency to rely on technology rather than relate to the world around us. Liam relies heavily on digital artifacts with his memories to prove that something happened - a stolen look, an insincere gesture - but he sees too late that his obsession with what has already occurred is deeply damaging to his future. 3. Be Right Back Black Mirror'S Be Right Back | Channel 4 Everyone who lost loved ones wished, at least once, that they could have another moment with the outgoing person. Black Mirror'S Season 2 Opener Be Right Backte offers mourners the chance to re-connect with their dying spouses, children, parents or friends, and we are facing a world of mourning from AI aides. We see how Martha (Agent Carter's Hayley Atwell), her husband Ash (Ex Machina's Domhnall Gleeson) plays out through the eyes of a young widow who falls into a deep depression after her sudden death. He tries to connect to it almost at first with a computer program that mimics even the slightest characteristics of his voice and personality. But it orders a deluxe version - a realistic synthetic clone - and quickly realizes that even smart and the most accurate technologies can't make up for anything real. As with the best episodes of Black Mirror, Be Right Back plays well on multiple levels. It serves as a cautionary story against the prey falling into the artificial quality of technology-based relationships, but it also shows us exactly why Martha and others will just do it. In tone and aesthetics, this life brings cold, a sense of numbing of grief and loss, but also, in its own chilling way, a beautiful love story. Which makes it even harder to watch Martha and Ash's ill-ed meet, but it makes it impossible to look elsewhere. 4. White Bear Black Mirror's White Bear I Channel 4 Sometimes if you think you are under constant scrutiny watched, evaluated, judged - you are not alone. This deep distrust of Black Mirror's star, disturbing White Bear a terrified and utterly confused Victoria (Lenora Crichlow), who tries to piece together scattered pieces of her memory when they are not trying to kill her, while fleeing masked assailants who film her on their smartphones. The episode plays out like an independent horror vinyeti, from opening moments to spine-tingling closing shot — not only because of the situation the protagonist finds himself in, but also because of late-stage revelations as to why he's being pursued. One of the most disturbing episodes in Black Mirror's canon, White Bear, works because it take on the undymble guality of many of our daily interactions and mourns them up a notch. There's something eerie about the guiet, detached road where Victoria's followers follow her. More importantly, the episode only examines how easy it is to remove even the most of ourselves, using our phones and devices as a layer between emotion and reality. 5. Nosedive | Netflix At first glance, the premiere of Black Mirror's Rosedive | Netflix At first glance, the premiere of Black Mirror Season 3 episode feels a little too much in terms of criticism of our social media apps. After all, this is not the first series to try to address the topic and criticize the existence of applications and platforms that we use to derive meaning or connect with each other. But Nosedive offers a sobering glimpse of what can lead to our networking habits - and does it both visually stunningly and insidiously. This is Lacie (Jurassic World's Bryce Dallas Howard), a try-hard young professional who, like everyone else around her, constantly follows the hammer of new social media fads. He uses his smartphone to rate everyone he encounters from the coffee man. His own brother. But in this Black Mirror world, social media success is not intangible evidence that can only take you as a digital brand. This is a valid currency, a real measure of success and vitality, such as a real-time, crowd-sourced FICO score. Howard is increasingly ambivalent Lacie, so desperately wanting and pitch perfect as he will try almost anything to get the high four ratings he needs. Nosedive works as a biting satire of how we position ourselves in the best possible light (and filter) when it comes to our online interactions, but it also shows have to live in a rose-colored reality. 6. San Junipero Black Mirror's San Junipero I Netflix words are hopeful, and Black Mirror is rarely used together. If anything, the main criticism of the show is that it is very imymy about technology and human nature. That's just one reason why Season 3's San Juniperonun Black Mirror stands out. It offers perhaps the most detailed and irrational projection of future technological advances. It also shows us a rare side of using scientific progress to change the way we see the world. San Junipero Yorkie (Mackenzie Davis) and Kelly (Gugu Mbatha-Raw) watch two voung girls drawn to each other at the dance club in the 1980s - if increasingly bizarre - holiday town. They form an intense romantic bond, but forces far beyond their control and their own uncertainties initially prevent them from actually exploring the possibilities of their relationship. The episode latched on on to the feeling of easy nostalgia to attract us. But it is the characters who engage us, played to defenseless and nuanced perfection. San Junipero takes a dark and unexpected turn, as Black Mirror wont to make the episode.
