It contains not only the kind of cord and wireless chainsaws that everyone recognizes, but also chainsaw loppers and pole saws. Whatever tree clearance or management tasks you have in mind, BLACK+DECKER has a tool for the task. And while electric chainsaws are often seen as less aggressive than their gas counterparts, there's little the high-performance electric models can't handle. The only challenge is to decide which one is suitable for your garden. Main considerationsCorded vs. wirelessFor some it's a simple decision. If price is an important factor, then a wired BLACK+ DECKER chainsaw is always cheaper, as for if, than its wireless counterpart. On the other hand, it is not practical (or safe) to run an extension cable more than 100 meters, so if you need to work further away than you need a wireless chainsaw. Of course, the downside with wireless is run time. Yes, you compensate by buying a spare battery, but they are not cheap. Even if you have to work for a few hours and don't have a power source for the charger, one battery may not be enough. PowerThen there is the question of power. Cut chainsaws can run on the same output pretty much all day. You run out of energy before the chainsaw does! Modern lithium-ion batteries don't have the gradual (and frustrating) power outages that old nickel-cadmium ones had, but when they go flat, it's with relatively little warning. The more power you use, the faster the drain. Still, if you need a break, a wired chainsaw will help you! Attempts at comparison are not facilitated by differences in the way the specifications are presented: wired motors in amplifiers (A) and wireless in volts (V). Direct comparisons are not accurate, but the bottom line is that larger numbers equal more power. StaffBestReviewsThe bar size on BLACK + DECKER chainsaws ranges from 10 to 18 inches, although wireless models don't go larger than 12 inches. Landscaping experts think 16 inches to the minimum for cutting down trees of a significant size, so smaller models are designed for pruning, trimming, maintenance, and cutting firewood. If you're struggling to imagine the difference, look at a tape measure and you'll soon get an idea of what you expect to cut with each different size tool. PerformanceWhen it comes to wireless performance, BLACK + DECKER says its 40volt Max chainsaw with its standard 2.0-amp-hour battery can make 60 cuts in 4x4 pine wood on a single charge. The problem is that most people don't use a chainsaw to cut pine wood! Many of the trees in your garden could be hardwood, and firewood almost always is, so that reduces what it can do. Balanced with that is the fact that you will rarely cut anything like that thickness. It's a very popular chainsaw, so we're not suggesting it's substandard, but it's worth looking at the owner's feedback to get a real indication of its abilities. Additional featuresAll BLACK+DECKER chainsaws have automatic chain beolied, keeping them cool while working and extending the chain's life. They also have tool-free voltage adjustment (another bonus) and a chain brake, a safety feature that stops the chain from moving even if the trigger is pulled. Batteries you have two digits to watch, voltage and ampere-hours (Ah). You don't do anything about the tension. A 20-volt battery doesn't work on a 40-volt tool, and vice versa. The amp-hour rating, on the other hand, has a major impact on the maturity. The included batteries from BLACK+DECKER are a modest 2.0 amps, but larger models are available. If you need spare parts, it's definitely an area we'd like to maximize. If you're using a black+decker chainsaw pulled, make sure it's plugged into a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) socket. It's really hard to tell because it depends on the hardness of the wood you cut (pine cuts much easier than oaks, for example) and how often. As a rough guide, it will probably be every five to ten hours of use. You'll know soon - you'll get dust or sludge instead of nice clean curls, and it will feel like the teeth are rubbing rather than cutting. The work will be much easier and faster with a sharp knife, so it's worth taking a little time off to sharpen it. It's a simple task once you're used to it, and it's really not worth getting off. To secure the terminals of the old battery in place, I have cut a hole for (+) terminal 18ga wire and a slot for a (-) terminals using a push drill into a plastic distributor that you have saved from Step 1. Pull both terminals through their designated slots and using JB Weld epoxy glue, attach the aforementioned distributor into the Top battery part, sand it in advance (and the distributor for better adhesion). While it dries, cut a wooden block using a handsaw to fit evenly with the 20v battery (as seen in the first photo). Put wooden block with 2 construction screws (1in is fine) through the sides. Also, as seen in the photo, mark the terminal locations on the wooden block. As for terminals myself, I've cut them out of a curtain rod brackets - perfect angle of 90 degrees and it already had a hole!!! Chiseled into a bed in front of those terminals on the wooden block and secured them with a single screw. Then I had to extend the wires and solder to corresponding terminals. I used an 18ga wire extender to add extra length to a positive (+) terminal and soldered on the other end of a (-) terminal. Soldered 16ga yellow wire to a metal bracket on the battery and the other end of a (-) terminal on the wooden block. At this point it is a good idea to use your multi-meter to check for continuity of your wires. Which means you need to make sure that + is + and - is -. Mine was good! After chiseling terminal beds, I broke my wooden block half and was too lazy to cut out a new one, so I used some extra epoxy glue to attach it to the plastic casing. It wouldn't move a millimeter!!! Mount old battery casing, insert a 20v lithium battery and test it!!! It worked like a charm!!! You see how excited I am from watching the video!!! P.S. I hope you enjoyed my tutorial.
