Many bug bites look alike, but if a venomous spider has bitten you, you can not immediately feel it. Many people do not notice the bite of the insect until they react to poison or saliva from the creature. Redness, swelling and itching at the site of the bite are all very common symptoms. If you've been on the street, or if you're collecting wood from a steep pile, you can run the risk of biting from a venomous spider. In fact, you can also get spider bites while sleeping! While all spiders are fangs, and most injectable poison occurs in their prey, very few spiders have teeth that can break and damage human skin. Other symptoms include bull-eye-shaped bites, pain, fever and chills. While some bites recover on their own with 7 to 10 days, the skin in the center of the bite for the second time can be dark blue/purple and turn into a dark open throat that grows as the surrounding skin dies. This ulcer usually stops growing within ten days after the bite, but full treatment can take months. Wolf spiders are very common in basements, as well as other cool, dark places. If the victim has trouble breathing or shows other symptoms of an allergic reaction, pay immediate emergency medical attention. Do not try to treat at home.
