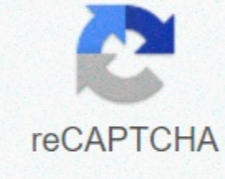

Anonymous std testing and treatment

The STD/SMI test is a medical test to determine the presence of a sexually transmitted disease (STD) or sexually transmitted infection (SMI). A sexually transmitted infection is an infection that is mainly spread by sexual contact with an infected person. Different tests are used to detect different STDs. There is no single procedure or test that can detect all sexually transmitted infections. Different SMI tests may require different types of samples from different parts of the body, such as blood (serum) samples from the vein or fingertip, tampon samples may be oral, urethra, vaginal or, or even skin scratches or skin biopsies from the affected area of the skin. An STD/SMI test usually refers to any of the many tests that can be used to detect sexually transmitted infection. STDs and STIs commonly tested in Singapore include gonorrhoea, syphilis, chlamydia, genital herpes, genital warts, hepatitis and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection. If you are sexually active, getting tested for STD is one of the most important things you can do to protect your health. Make sure you have an open and honest conversation about your sexual history and STD tests with your doctor and ask if you need to try STD. If because you are comfortable talking to your regular healthcare provider about STD, there are many clinics that provide confidential and free or inexpensive tests. Here's a quick overview of STD testing recommendations: STD verification information for healthcare providers can be found here. All adults and adolescents between the ages of 13 and 64 should be tested at least once for HIV. All sexually active women under the age of 25 should be tested annually for gonorrhoea and chlamydia. Women 25 years of age and older with risk factors such as new or multiple sexual partners or a sex partner who has STD should also be tested for gonorrhoea and chlamydia every year. All pregnant women should be tested for syphilis, HIV and hepatitis B starting at the beginning of pregnancy. At risk pregnant women should also be examined chlamydia and gonorrhoea, starting at the beginning of pregnancy. If necessary, the tests must be repeated in order to protect the health of mothers and their babies. All sexually active gay and bisexual men should be tested at least once a year for syphilis, chlamydia and gonorrhoea. Those with multiple or anonymous partners should be subject to more frequent checks on STDs (i.e. every 3-6 months). Sexually active gay and bisexual men may benefit from more frequent HIV tests (e.g. every 3 to 6 months). Anyone who has unsafe sex or shares injection drug equipment should be tested for HIV at least once a year. The Sexual Health or Genitourinary Medicine (GUM) Clinic specializes in sexual health, and can provide treatment to many STDs. You can meet to go to an SMI clinic, or sometimes there is a disembarkation clinic, which means that you can just appear without a meeting. You may feel embarrassed, but do not need to – the staff of these clinics are accustomed to testing all kinds of infections. It's their job and they're not going to judge you. They should do their best to explain everything and should make you feel at ease. You can contact a sexual health clinic, whether you are a man or a woman, regardless of your age, regardless of symptoms of SMI. If you are under the age of 16, the service is still confidential and the clinic will not tell your parents. If they suspect that you or another young person is in danger of being harmed, they may have to tell other health services, but they will talk to you before. Find a sexual health clinic. When you go to a sexual health clinic, you will be asked to provide your name and contact details. You don't have to give your real name if you don't want to. If you do this, it will be treated as confidential. Your GP will not be told about your visit without your permission. If you have tests and the results of your visit do not reach you, the clinic will have to contact you later, so provide the correct contact details. The clinic will ask how you want to get results. Typically, they can be displayed by phone, text, or unmarked letter. You will see a doctor or nurse who will ask about your medical and sexual history. Be prepared to answer questions about your sex life, including the last time you had sex whether you had unprotected sex which you have any symptoms that you think you may have an infection. You may ask to see a woman or a man's doctor or nurse if you want, but you may have to wait longer than usual for one to become available. Your doctor or nurse will tell you what tests they think you need. They should explain what is going on and why they offer these tests. If you are not sure about anything, ask them to explain. Tests may include: urine (pee) sample blood samples swabs from the urethra (tube urine comes out) your genital test if you are a woman, tampons from the vagina, which you can usually do yourself. Testing for chlamydia and gonorrhoea usually requires only a urine sample or self-taken swab for a woman. HIV and syphilis tests require a blood sample. Tests for herpes are usually not done unless you have ulcers on your genitals or exhausted. In this case, the tampon will be taken out of pain. It will be an awkward time. Learn more about: With some tests, you can get results - and treatment if you need it - on the same day. Others may have to wait a week or 2. In this case, the clinic will check how you would like to get the results. If the STI test is positive, you will be asked to return to the clinic to talk about your results and the treatment you need. Many STDs can be cured with antibiotics. Some infections, such as HIV, do not cure, but there are treatments available. The clinic can advise you on this and help you contact the counsellor. If possible, tell your sexual partner and all former partners so that they can also be tested and treated. If you do not want to do this, the clinic can usually do it for you - partner message and the clinic will not disclose who you are. The best way to do it Protect yourself from getting or transmitting an infection by using a condom every time you have sex. The clinic can give you a few condoms so you can practice safer sex. Always buy condoms that CE mark or BS kite mark on the packet. This means that they have been tested according to high safety standards. Condoms without the CE marking or BS kite marking will not meet these standards and should not be used. Get tips on how to use condoms properly. Remember that once having an SMI, you are not immune – you can get the same infection again.
