The School Counselor Summative Performance Report is intended as a tool for administrators and directors to give school counselors an assessment of their professional performance. Students with access to school counselors and comprehensive school guidance programs are more likely to achieve academically and behaviorally; especially students in high-poverty schools (Lapan, Gysbers, Bragg, & Pierce, 2012) School counselling programs support the Standards of Learning by providing guidance to students in their academic, career, and social-emotional development. School counselors work with parents, teachers, administrators and others to promote learning and help students establish and achieve their education, career and personal goals. School counselors provide leadership to ensure students benefit from effective strategies and services aligned with the Standards for School Guidance Programs in Virginia Public Schools. The standards are organized according to grade level among the following objectives: Academic Development – Students will obtain the academic preparation essential to choose from a variety of educational, training and employment options upon completion of secondary school. Career Development – Students will explore the world of work to make informed career decisions. Social/Emotional – Students will create an understanding of, and respect for, self and others, and the skills to be responsible citizens. School counselors are trained to provide counselling services through eight different types of delivery methods: Counseling Curriculum Small Group Counseling Individual Counseling Crisis Response Individual Student Planning Consultation Collaboration Referral The Virginia School Counselor Association (VSCA) and Virginia Department of Education are jointly working to clearly define these services because we know that, by provide direct services that include individual and small group counselling sessions and evidence-based classroom lessons dealing with conflict resolution, bullying prevention, self-regulation, personal responsibility, frustration tolerance and more, school counselors have the ability to significantly impact the lives of all students, including students who are disconnected and disencoused. For example, some U.S. states later have cut-off dates for starting school. Usually they want you to be by September 1, 5 to start kindergarten (which is right around when school starts, and usually no more than a few weeks into the school year) but in a couple say the cut-off is as late as December. So in that case, the youngest toddlers will still be 4 and not turn 5 until Dec., then in 1st grade they'll be 5 and not turn 6 until Dec., etc. And also, some children may be held back and need to repeat a year of school if they are struggling, so they may end up being a year older than normal in these grades.
