Breaking the grid saratoga arts

Categories: Arts, Entertainment, Life & Arts, Saratoga County SARATOGA Springs — Saratoga Springs' latest art fair carries both pain and hope sparked by the recent Black Lives Matter protests. Black + Indigenous Artists of Color Matter has 40 works by artists around the capital region. When it opens on Saturday, it will be the first physical exhibition that supervisor Becky Zeh will be able to install since mid-March, when Saratoga Arts will have to close its doors due to COVID-19. Since then, Zeh has organized and curated several online exhibitions, including Network Break, a digital reading of the art center's traditional 10×10 show. It's exciting to be back at the Arts Center and being able to present artworks in person again, Zie says, to Zeh, black and white + indigenous artists of the exhibition's color matter is particularly important to present at this time. After George Floyd's death inspired Black Johns Matter protests across the country, including the capital region, Zee made a call for the work of black and indigenous artists of color. This is a great opportunity at this [time] to lift the artistic voices of these artists and bring them to the forefront, Zie says, some works such as one of Bianca de La's Schenectady artists are direct responses to the recent protests. In Deila's mural, a black boy and girl are featured in T-shirts that say Hope 4 Us and Help Us 4. After the protests in Troy, there was a time when businesses rode their windows with plywood. We're very excited to have this because it's such a meaningful piece to have on the show, Zie says, calling for action for this generation to create a better world for the next world. In another work, police officers are featured wearing gas masks and holding batons. Who's question protecting us? Spans across the top, marking by two white stars. Created by Visher Ferry's Marcus Kwamy Anderson, the piece asks a question that many have been struggling with lately. Although this isn't the first time Saratoga Arts has presented a show focused on black artists, that's not what the center has often done. Maya Lewis, whose work has been featured in the show, told Zie that the exhibition should be the first step for Saratoga Arts. Xi agreed. You can't just have one show and then it is. Moving forward should acknowledge our shortcomings as an organization and try to do better. I think this is a good first step and it gives these artists a platform to express themselves artistically. At this time, the capacity of the gallery is closed to 10 people due to restrictions on social distancing.
