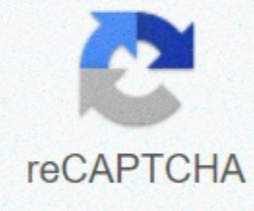




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## High school means 10th or 12th up board

Andover (as it is commonly known) has historical significance to an original feeder school in Yale. It was the first private secondary school to have concluded and implemented a policy on the reception of the blind. Andover is able to satisfy 100% of the family's proven financial need through grants. Like its ancient rival Exeter, Andover faculty consists of 80% advanced grades - holders. The school, which also uses the Harkness method and has both a rich tradition, offers a wide range of music classes---s many students take private lessons at the prep school at the nearby New England Conservatory. In addition to academics, all Students of Andover participate in a work-work program and are assigned to different jobs throughout the year.
