

The carpet is over 1,000 years old and recognized by UNESCO. It is 230 feet long and is thought to have been embroidered around 1070. Scene 1: King Edward the Confessor Even if you're the most passionate Second World War history buffs and are anxious to get to the landing beaches of Normandy, you'll want to save an hour or so by visiting Bayeux Tapestry, you ask? Bayeux Tapestry shows 50 scenes showing the events up to the Norman conquest. It tells the story of King Edward of England sending Harold, Earl of Wessex, to Normandy to inform William (The Conqueror) that the king has chosen him to succeed him after his death. But when King Edward dies, Harold takes over the throne, forcing William to fight for his right to be king. The carpet culminates in the Battle of Hastings in 1066. Scene 7: English go ashore ... Bayeux Tapimetsa Museum audio guides that explain scenes on the carpet was rolled out a few times a year to teach people about Norman's conquest history. History is fascinating, not to mention learning in the same way people did so long ago. You leave the museum behind wishing there were more tapestries to see! Visit Notre-Dame de Bayeux for Cathédrale. The cathedral opened in 1077 and was the first home of Bayeux Tapestry. The cathedral is towering over all the other buildings. It's one thing to see in a great, gorgeous Cathedral in a big city like Paris, but when you see one small town like Bayeux, it shows how powerful the church was hundreds of vears ago. Baveux Cathedral is a great example of this. You can see why people living in medieval times would have felt feared and protected by god and priests serving in his name. Walk to bayeux's open-air market. Every Saturday along the main road through Bayeux vendors sell fresh fish, produce, bottles of Calvados (apple brand produced in the area), household items, clothes and souvenirs. Walking through markets like these, the food always feels so fresh! Scallops are a local Normandy specialty. When they are in season, if you visit, make sure to try some. I haven't tasted any better! Whether walking through the market on Rue Saint-Patrice, be sure to take a break and veer off to walk along the Bayeux canal and see the water wheel and waterfall it creates. Places to visit Normandy at France's American Cemetery awaits over Omaha Beach. The French gave this land to the United States for aid during World War II. If you're in this country, you're technically american. No doubt you've come to visit the D-Day beaches of Normandy, Pont-du-Hoc, American Cemetery, D-Day Museum, and countless other Wwii monuments. While you could rent a car and self-drive to these attractions, you'd definitely miss a ton of incredible information. The best Normandy tours are usually led outside by knowledgeable locals who pick you up and drop you off in your hotel after a full day. You can visit D-Day beaches, famous battlefields, monuments, cemeteries and more. Often these guides and their families have lived in Normandy for generations and can tell anecdotal Wwii stories passed on to their relatives that can't find any history book. Their personal perspective on the history of the Second World War may offer nuances that build layers for your understanding of the time period. Located in Bayeux, Mont Saint-Michel is just a 1.5-hour drive away. You can rent a car, but with a 2 or 3-day getaway from Paris, I recommend keeping it simple and going to mont Saint-Michel guide. The information in this guide is not only useful, but you also need to worry about navigating the area. Especially in late spring and summer, Mont Saint-Michel can be quite busy and someone who knows the area will make the day that much better. Prefer paris to Normandy tour?
