Position your video precisely using axes Here's what this method looks like. If you already have the URL of the specific YouTube video you want to use with a direct link, you can move to the Url tab and paste the link directly. To move the video around the slide, you also have the option to drag the video exactly where you want it. You can also use transitions around the video to resize as needed. You can't crop the embedded video, so you need to think about the layout of the entire slide to combine the video nicely. Once you are completely satisfied with the size, location and length of the YouTube video clip, just press Enter and everything is ready. If you need to make additional changes to the video later, all you have to do is click on the video to start editing. This method can be ideal if you already have a recorded video on your computer or device, but you don't necessarily want to upload it to YouTube. From here, on the menu bar at the top of the screen, click Insert and select Video. At the top of the comed box you'll see three tabs: Search, by URL, and Google Drive. What if you have a video from other Platforms that you want to place in your slideshow from a platform other than YouTube or Google Drive? Ideally, if there is a way to download this video and upload it to YouTube or Google Drive, this is your best way of acting. But if you don't have this option, you can include an external video in your slideshow with a little work. Instead of placing the video directly in your slideshow, what you really do is add a direct link to the video that you can click on your presentation. However, to sort things out and make your slide visually more engaging, we recommend linking the URL to the video's own screenshot. In this way, you click a related picture instead of a random link during your presentation. Let's say you have a video landing page created with Wave.video and you want to show it during your presentation. To do this, you want to start by taking an interesting moment from the video and taking the screenshot. Be sure to crop the screenshot so that you are looking at only one screenshot from the video itself, not your entire desktop or browser. After your screenshot is saved on your computer, return to your Google Slides window, click the Insert tab, and select Picture. Find, select, and add the screenshot file on your computer to your presentation. From here, you can adjust the size and positioning of the screenshot as needed. When you're satisfied with its size and location, click on the picture and return to the Insert tab. Select Link, paste the URL of your video, and click App. From here, you should open a direct link to your video when you click on the screenshot for your slide. Note, however, that when you use this option, you won't have the option to crop or otherwise edit your video. This means that if you have a specific segment that you want to show to your audience, you may need to find that section manually. As you can see, learning to embed Google Slides videos is quite simple. And when you do this several times, in the future video embedding becomes second nature. Even as a reminder, it's always a good idea to check your videos to make sure they work before a double-(and even three-) presentation. This is especially important if you are going to present the slideshow from a different computer than the one you created. From there, you can make any last-minute tweaks you might need and move it into the presentation with a little extra confidence.
