For example, varsity and JV Division issues vary from something to significantly more difficult than the issues used for high school and elementary school departments, and that USABB issues, while intended to play among high school and elementary school students, are on all academic subjects, not just in history (although many questions from history can be found in these circles). Rules & Format Overview National History Bee Stage 1 – Online Regional Qualifying Exam (ORQE) THE ORQE is a test with 50 multiple-choice questions to all aspects of history. Students earn 2 points for the correct answer and 0 points for empty and incorrect answers. This exam must be supervised by a teacher, parent or other responsible adult who may not provide assistance to the test taker. National History Bee Stage 2 – Regional Finals Regional Finals Bee Rules can be downloaded here (we use the same rules for National History Bee, National Science Bee, US Academic Bee and International Geography Bee). 3 rounds of a buzzer-based game in qualifying and 1 round in the final round. Students in grades 7 and 8 play in a separate division with rounds of 30 questions, while students in grades 6 and Elementary Division (grades 5 and younger) play in separate divisions with 25 class questions 6, 7 and 8) play separately by class on 30 questionnaires. Elementary divisions (all students in grade 5 and younger) play together on 25 questionnaires. Up to 10 students compete together in the room at any one time. One point is thuded for each correct answer; only one student can score on the issue. After a student comes along with an incorrect answer, he can't call that question again. 3 The answers kill the question. If the student is the third to answer incorrectly before the end of the question, he has achieved -1; otherwise, students do not lose points due to an incorrect answer (first or second incorrect answer, and the third incorrect answer if the question is read to the end does not lead to a loss of point). When a student reaches 6 points, they will finish for the round, but will receive up to 9 bonus points based on the speed at which they finish the round with bonus points awarded as follows: Question Six # Bonus Points Round score 6 9 15 7, 8 8 14 9 10 7 13 11, 12 6 12 13, 14, 15 5 11 16, 17, 18 4 10 19, 20, 21 3 9 22, 23, 24 2 8 25, 26, 27 1 7 28, 29, 30 0 6 All students play 3 preliminary rounds. The best students in every age division make the finals. Approximately the top 50% in each age group will qualify for nationals. The distribution of questions for the Regional Finals can be found here. National History Bee Stage 3 – National Championships Rules used in regional finals are also used in national championships, except that all students compete in 4 preliminary rounds (not 3). We anticipate there will be 3 rounds of playoffs in each age division; approximately the best 128 students in each age group will enter the play-offs. In each round of the playoffs, 8 students are projected to play in the room, and the top 2 in each room will advance to the next round, although this is a function of the number of students competing, and will be finalized after registration closes. All issues in the regional finals and national championship of national history bee will be in the form of a tossup question. Tossup questions are questions based on the buzz of a short paragraph length that progress from harder to easier information from the beginning to the end of the question. Topics can cover any aspect of world history, including but not limited to: historical geography, recent history, science history, literature history, art and music history, and sports and entertainment history. Roughly 40-50% of the questions are about U.S. history (including colonial history before 1776). National History Bowl – Regional Tournament History Bowl rules are available here. The rules for the National History Bowl high school division are the same as stated for the Varsity and Junior Varsity divisions, with the exception that there are 8 issues in the first quarter in the High School Division, not 10, and in the third quarter there are 6 issues in each 60 second category, not 8. In regional tournaments, teams usually play 5 preliminary rounds. In some tournaments, teams can play only 4 preliminary rounds (if there is an odd number of teams) or even 6 preliminary rounds (if there are 4 teams or if rebracketing is used at lunchtime). Teams are ranked on the record and then on points (unless there is an odd number of teams and round robin format is not used, in which case, they are ranked on average points). The best teams at 2-16 enter the playoffs depending on turnout. National History Bowl – National Championship teams will be guaranteed at least 6 games in the 2020 high school national championships. At least 3 rounds of the playoffs will be played after the conclusion of round 6. More details on the exact number of rounds will be available once the number of teams on the field is finalized. Teams, however, are projected to play round robin among the 3 other teams in rounds 1-3, followed by the top 2 teams from each home pool to advance to the round of the round 4-6, while the fourth-ranked teams, and most or all of the teams for 3rd place, will play in consolation pools in rounds 4-6. Having a buzzer system is never a requirement to compete in our events, but having a buzzer system can help simulate playing tournaments in practice, and History Bowl and Academic Bowl teams get discounts on tournaments they compete in when they bring buzzers.
