The formation of eponymous rocks, one of the highest points in Greenville County, is a granite outcrop of gneiss at 3,208 feet (978 m) above sea level in the Blue Ridge Escarpment of the Blue Ridge Mountains and rests approximately 2,000 feet (600 m) above Piedmont below. (The origin of the name Caesars Head is disputed, although the outcrop was probably named after an early mountaineering dog.) [1] Caesars Head State Park and Jones Gap State Park are jointly administered by the state Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism as part of Mountain Bridge Wilderness. History In 1825 state engineer and architect Robert Mills described Caesars Head as a granite mass, rising from the valley, through which a river fast winds its turbulent way... the stone ledges, climbing almost perpendicular, and in length, hanging on to [the] top, so they seem totter at their fall. [2] After the completion of Jones Gap Road in 1848, a former state senator, Benjamin Hagood, bought some 2,400 acres around Caesars Head, where he built a summer cottage, and later a hotel, to take advantage of fresh breezes in the area, moderate temperatures and stunning views. [3] The hotel closed in 1862, and Hagood died in 1865, leaving the property to her daughter Eliza and her husband, Dr. Francis Miles, the first doctor in Pickens County. During the Civil War, the area was frequented by defectors of the Confederate Army,[4] but in 1876 the Mileses were operating a health complex on the mountain. [5] In 1880, Miles sold the hotel to E.M. Seabrook in Charleston, which expanded the inn and associated cottages but was unable to afford the mortgage. In 1885, the property returned to Miles, said to be a model innkeeper of a comfortable primitive hotel. In 1897, the Mileses made their stay at Furman University in exchange for an annuity and a free room and pension for the rest of their lives. [6] In 1924, Furman sold the property to a promotional company interested in selling lots for summer homes. The hotel continued to operate even as the ground promoter failed during the Depression. In 1946 the Pete and Tom Marchant bought the property and added tennis courts and a swimming pool. The hotel is a country house, and the adjacent quarters —the original house of Hagood— burned down in the early hours of September 9, 1954. [7] The Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism acquired the park lands from several owners between 1976 and 1986. [8] Recreation The park is noted for its panoramic views of the mountain country and is a destination for hiking, trailside camping and picnicking. A popular hiking trail in the park leads to the 128m high Raven Cliff Falls, crossed by a suspension bridge. There are five more waterfalls in the park. [9] The park allows fishing with artificial baits for stream, rainbows and brown trout on the Middle Health River and Julian and Matthews Creeks. [10] Each fall, the park becomes a seasonal home for thousands of migrant hawks. [11] Other wildlife include the black bear, the peregrine falcon and the federally endangered green salamander. [12] The 276 U.S. Park Headquarters Visitor Center includes an interpretive museum that features photographs of the park's human history, as well as a relief map of the entire Mountain Bridge Wilderness area. A 2km long hiking trail leads to Raven Cliff Falls, where a suspension bridge offers wonderful views of the waterfalls as the water sinks into the cove below. An additional stamp is available at reception at the visitor centre. A granite gneiss surfaced over the dramatic Blue Ridge Escarpment gives its name to Caesars Head State Park. Every fall, from the easily accessible view above the rocky peak of the Blue Ridge Escarpment, view users are treated to the Hawk Watch program and a spectacular view stretching to North Carolina and Georgia.Caesars Head connects to Jones Gap State Park in what is known as the Wilderness Area of Mountain Bridge, a 13,000-acre area of unspoilt forest Hikers can take a number of hiking trails and tour hiking trails that connect the parks, and trailside camping is available to those who choose the longest routes. One of Caesars Head's most popular routes is the four-mile, round-trip Raven Cliff Falls. This hiking trail opens onto the panoramic views, where you can enjoy the 450-metre Raven Cliff Falls. There is also a 6.6-mile round trip to a suspension bridge that crosses the creek above Raven Cliff Falls. The bridge offers a unique view of the falls as they enter the mountain cove below.
