Income level mclane high families What are family income students at Mclane High School? To determine this, we look at the number of students who qualify for free or reduced lunches, a classification by the U.S. federal government. To qualify for a reduced-price meal, family income must be below 185% of the federal poverty guidelines. For a family of 4, this means an income of about \$45,000 or less. In order to for a free meal, the family's income must be below 130% of the guidelines on poverty. For a family of 4, this means an income of about \$32,000 or less. The lower the percentage of students who qualify for free or reduced-price meals, the higher the income levels are likely to be. At Mclane High, 9.8% of students qualify for reduced-price lunches and 82.0% qualify for free lunches. This means Mclane High has a high percentage of students in or near poverty. Nearly a third of all schools in California show this level of poverty, and by National Center for Education Statistics standards, Mclane High can be classified as a high poverty school. The income level of families in Fresno is therefore likely to be low. To study this, we look at disciplinary data for two types of incidents at Mclane High: referrals to law enforcement agencies (when incidents are reported to the police) and arrests. How good of an education will you get at Mclane High School? Will you be competitive for college? Will you have access to advanced classes? We've compiled everything we could find about Mclane High's graduates here. Grading Rate To begin with, an important benchmark for academic achievement is graduation rate. For all students starting high school at Mclane High, the state of California wants as many students to graduate as possible, because a high school diploma can make a big difference in getting a job. At Mclane High, 72% (out of 490) Mclane High students graduate within four years of starting high school. This is how this stands for other schools. The California state government has defined 90% as a target rate. The state average is around 80-85%. Mclane High is in the 35th percentile of all public high schools in California for graduation. This is below average. In general, a graduation rate of over 90% is considered to be good and well above average, and below 75% is well below average. As you probably know, the SAT is a critical test used for college admissions. The higher the score you get, the better your academic performance compared to students across the country, and the easier it is to get into top colleges. We did in-depth research and found the average Mclane High School SAT score. The average composite SAT score is a 1140 out of 2400, compared to a national average of 1,500. Every year, about 251 at Mclane High take the SAT. This is a very low SAT score, putting Mclane High in the bottom 25% of all California schools, and well below the national average. Only 6% of SAT takers here score above the national average. Unfortunately, this suggests that most who attends Mclane High is not high achievers, and may have difficulty getting accepted to a good college. In California, the ACT is less popular than the SAT. Fewer students take the ACT, and usually these students are more motivated and academically prepared for college. Therefore, it is harder to compare Mclane High School ACT scores with the rest of the country. At Mclane High, the average ACT composite score was 15, compared to the national average of 20. Each year, about 51 of 1921 total students take the ACT. Unfortunately, this is well below average performance, putting Mclane High in the bottom 25% of high schools in California. Most students who take the ACT here are well below the national average. Of all the AP testers, 17 students passed every AP test they took, which is a fantastic job. 15 students passed some but not all AP exams, and 261 students failed to pass any AP exam they took. Unfortunately, this is poor performance compared to other secondary schools. At Mclane High School, the majority of AP students fail all the AP exams they take. This usually means they are not sufficiently prepared for the national AP exam by the end of the year. This isn't necessarily the school's fault. AP courses may be too advanced for the typical student at Mclane High, and it's still good that AP courses are offered at all. In addition, it is possible that a majority of AP exams taken by students at Mclane High are on the harder side. But if you are a student at Mclane High, this is a warning that you must go beyond the typical student to pass your AP exams. This can involve tutorials, figuring out who the better AP teachers are and trying to get into their classes, and working hard. If Mclane High students meet or exceed state standards, they are academically prepared to graduate high school and go to college. Specifically, we care about the percentage of students who meet or exceed state standards. The greater

this number, the higher the preparation of students at Mclane High. At Mclane High School, 17% of students meet or exceed state standards in English/language art. Academic offers In addition to the regular high school curriculum, many high schools like Mclane High School offer advanced courses as part of the Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate (IB) program. Short Intro to AP/IB AP and IB courses are designed on the severity of college introductory courses. There are several important advantages to taking advanced courses at Mclane High. This is a reasonable number of AP subjects, putting Mclane High School in the top 50% of California schools that offer AP courses.
