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## Barnes and noble leatherbound classics list

Skip the introduction, take me straight to the list of books... How long has the series been going? Barnes and Noble presented their original series of exclusive classic collectible leather editions in 1992. The contents were mostly omnibus editions (with several titles by the same author in a single book) and the bindings were very traditional, with dark leather covers (glued) with light gold text and simple gutted edges, along with raised bands on the spine, golden page Carrol and its popularity sparked the beginning of the Collectible Classics that is best known today. Are the books in the collection classics series are covered in 'glued' leather. This is basically a mix of real skin (scraps and fibers remaining from processing real skin) and fake skin (typically a polyurethane binder), rolled together using adhesive glue and glued to a paper stand. In some cases, a second polyurethane coating can be added and embossed to create a texture closer to the real skin. Basically glued leather is leather what chipboard is for wood. So yes, most B&N book covers are made up of about 20% real skin. The Flexibound Editions, on the other hand, are practically completely in faux leather. How is the quality? Okay, that's a tough question. For the price, I think they're amazing. Do they compare themselves in quality to publishers selling fine print leather editions? Of course not. They're definitely very decorative shelf candy with their gorgeous cover designs and brightly colored covers, and I personally think anything that makes people more likely to pick up and read a classic novel is a great thing. Most books have decorative head and tail bands, golden or stained page borders, bound silk ribbon bookmarks, and decorative hubs on the spine. They're all relatively durable than your average paperback). The proof is in the bookstore, and I have a large number of B& N collectible classics on my shelves, keeping up with my much more expensive books than the Folio Society and Easton Press. But I have some caveats. Internally, I would rank them on par with a decent edition of the book club: they are related to the hybrid, with most having sewn signatures glued to the spine, meaning they will lie flat, but the glue does not last long. Translations used to Foreign language classics are the older ones available that are easier to read (if that's important to you, I recommend the Penguin Classics, which also have great notes). And some of the of the the volumes also had really disappointing errors in the text that were typically corrected in subsequent prints, but it's not much use if you have a previous edition (where I'm aware of these issues, I noticed the details below). The illustrations are often scanned by reprints, not original, so they're not as sharp as they might be. And while they look wonderful, I personally'm not a big fan of massive omnibus editions because they're really bulky to read when they get more than 700 pages or so. (I made an exception for that beautiful Alice omnibus 2018 though. I'm a big fan of Alice. Don't judge me...) Are some books the same only with different covers? Yes, the books in this series are often republished with the same internal content and a different binding: many of the titles in the Illustrated Children's Classics collection, for example, have the same content as the now out-ofprint Rainbow Classics collection, but have a different cover design. The Signature Editions collection was produced as a hardback between 2011 and 2012, and then re-released using almost the same cover designs a few years later, but with flexibound covers. It also works the other way - The Arabian Nights was released in 2009 with a series of illustrations, then again in 2011 with different illustrations, but the cover design is almost identical (if you look closely, you can see that some small Arabic symbols in the corner of the front cover have been replaced with decorative elements for the next edition). For books published before about 2005, several volumes have been republished several times with different covers but using the same ISBN number (if you check the original page of the series with more details about this collection, I have all the different covers there). Subsequent volumes have unique ISBN associated with different publication dates. For online ads, people sometimes get confused between the copyright date of the text and the B& N release date - the next date is the correct one. Do they maintain their value? In fact, since books are really reasonably priced to begin with, and are relatively robust, B& N collectible classics are one of those rare series where they actually mostly retain their value. Which books are worth the most? The volumes that are the most valuable at the moment are mainly children's books that have an emotional value and for some reason have been out of print for some time (although there is no guarantee that they will not return suddenly print because the content is out of copyright and B& Nowns the cover designs). The most coveted volume is probably The Chronicles of Narnia (it has a nice cover and and original illustrations by Pauline Baynes) followed by Little House: The First Five Novels by Laura Ingalls Wilder. The Emerald City of Oz omnibus is also relatively expensive at the moment, but with a new cover design coming out for the first five novels (and no commitment to printing the last five in older design), I'm not sure this will stay. Signature Editions are also relatively expensive on the offer market, because the binding material on these is quite much nicer than the flexibound editions that replaced them. What are the different collections within this series? B&N often puts different parts of their stores, and they have previously marketed sub-series through other booksellers using different identifiers. For the most part, you can identify these loose collections based on their different sizes and binding designs. I started creating separate pages with more detailed information about these sub-series if you're a really passionate collector (or like me, just hopelessly curious). If you're interested, you can take a look at the pages I'm building on the original series; signature editions, pocket classics, rainbow series and deluxe treasuries (which will be made live shortly). I can add more/put them faster if people are interested, let me know in the comments. Actually, if you're a passionate commentator, I'd really like to know what your favorite volumes are! (And although this list is not helpful at all – I couldn't find the information collected anywhere else on the web, which is page in the first place...) But now, on the list. He's a monster, because I wanted it to be exhaustive and complete. I hope it helps! This seems to be the time of year when I notice those leather-attached editions at Barnes and Noble. Some of the titles are about specific fan-based genres (Dr. Who, Star Wars), others are of a more historical nature (Texas Constitution anyone?). And then there are the rare birds that are no longer in print or available at Barnes & amp; Noble. This includes most of the titles prior to 2011. Some of the favorites: Chronicles of Narnia by C.S. Lewis (Barnes and Noble, 2009) Lists from \$92 to \$950 without mention of the press/edition. I was almost hopeful when I saw this title appear on the B& prior to 2011. price tag of \$18! – just to click on the link and find that, in fact, the title was only offered through market vendors for \$92-\$950. The edition/print is rarely mentioned. The price of these leather bound books is driven more by desire than anything I can measure. There is no mention of the number of copies published. The seems to rise as soon as the title is no longer available in stores or on the website. Seven Novels by H.G. Wells Lists from \$130 to \$215 without press/edition mention. Lovecraft (Barnes and Noble, 2010) Lists of \$40 - \$115 (with a mention of a 'first printing' listing for \$60) In 2013 I published a short list of some of the B& N Leatherbound Classics titles with their (then) listed value. Below is a chart showing how they compare now. Note: I discarded some of the higher prices if they were not in line with most of the collectible copies listed. I compared ad prices to Abebooks.com. Amazon.com, Barnesandnoble.com and listed the high-end average price for these titles. In most cases, the printout wasn't mentioned (vou'll still be able to find prices both higher and lower than those shown here, but that gives you a good average and excuses for spelling mistakes). And I know a lot of people are looking for the full list of titles published in the B& N Leatherbound Classics series. I haven't found a definitive list, though there's a list on Goodreads of 118 titles, compiled in 2012 (since anyone can add it, however, I'm not convinced it's limited to B& N Leatherbound Classics). I counted 132 titles (excluding the largest Book Audubon), with many repetitions from one year to the next. Here is the breakdown as far as I know (note: when there are duplicate titles, I compared the ISBN, the date of publication and the cover to determine that they were not the same copy.
