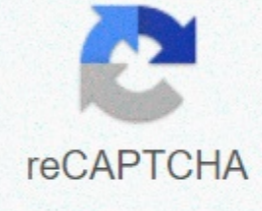

Sword and shield destiny knot

Image through The Pokémon Company If you plan to become a competitive battler in Pokémon Sword and Shield, sooner or later you'll need the Destiny Knot. The Destiny Knot is an important item when it comes to breeding Pokémon. It allows both parents to pass on five IVs to the child. The sixth IV remains randomized. This can of course lead to potential powerful Pokémon that can be used in competitive game. But where exactly do you find it in Sword and Shield? First, you have to beat the game, because you have to buy it through BP, which is rewarded in the Battle Tower. Then, after getting 10 BP, you want to go to Hammerlocke. Enter the central Pokémon Center and there will be a lady next to the Poké Mart section selling items in a BP store. You'll find the Destiny Knot here. One Destiny Knot costs 10 BP, but you always buy several. This is also the same store where you can buy important items such as the Protector, Reaper Cloth and more. If the holder falls in love, so will the opposing Pokémon. If a Pokémon in the Day Care center keeps this, 5 of his IVs are passed on to his offspring. When a Pokémon holding Destiny Knot lays an egg, five out of twelve IVs will be passed on to the child Pokémon. Make a Pokémon hold Destiny Knot when you take it at the Daycare Center. Read more about Training and Breeding in our guide. How to Train & Breed for Competitive Pokémon Even if you have two older Pokémon holding destiny knot, the effect will not overlap. The child Pokémon still gets only five IVs from the parents. Places where this item is currently unavailable. You exchange 10 BP to get Destiny Knot at BP Shops in Hammerlocke and Wyndon. Indeed, breeding allows players to make Pokémon with perfect nature and IVs consistently, although it does have some trouble. However, before a fan can grow perfect Pokémon, they must get Pokémon Sword and Shield's Destiny Knot, as this item plays a central role in the process. Pokémon Sword and Shield Destiny Knot Location To Create a Destiny Knot In Pokémon Sword and Shield, players must first complete the main story and earn 10 Battle Points by at the Battle Tower. With these earned points, fans should then head to the Pokémon Center in Hammerlocke and speak to the NPC which stands against the most right-wing wall. This NPC will have a number of items available, of which destiny knot is once the Destiny Knot. That said, before a player starts incorporating the Destiny Knot into their breeding in Pokémon Sword and Shield, they should do the following: Get the Everstone. Catch several Ditto's, each with four perfect IVs. Catch the Pokémon to be bred. Catch a Ditto with the desired nature. Give the Ditto with the desired nature the Everstone and breed it with the Pokémon from Step 3. At this point, players must have a perfectly-natured version of the Pokémon they want to breed, and they can now start the Destiny Knot in Pokémon Sword and Shield to work on perfect IVs. This process begins with giving one of the four perfect-IV Ditto's of Step 2 the Destiny Knot, making the perfect-natured Pokémon of interest the Everstone, and breeding them together about five times. When this first round of breeding is completed, players should look at the IVs of the offspring. More specifically, they need to find a offspring who has better INVs than its mother of the same species, and that offspring should be swapped with his parent for the next round of breeding. To note, Pokémon Sword and Shield fans should make sure they transfer the Everstone to these offspring to maintain its nature in the next generation. Players must now breed another batch of Pokémon and repeat the process described in the previous paragraph. This should be done until a descendant has all of the Ditto's perfect IVs, and fans should now turn to the other Ditto's that they collected in step 2. Here, players are looking for a Ditto that has the perfect IVs that the offspring lacks, and those two Pokémon must be bred together after Pokémon Sword and Shield's Destiny Knot and the Everstone are re-equipped to them. Over time, this will result in a offspring with perfect IVs, and players can then continue giving EV training in Pokémon Sword and Shield and leveling it up. These mark the final steps in creating the perfect Pokémon, and indeed fans should feel confident as they become their new companion in the fight against other trainers. Since there are no limits to the Destiny Knots you own, and it's all about having enough Battle Points, you can definitely go buckwild.
