The National Center for Education Statistics didn't have data for Idaho until the 2013-2014 school year. There are only two other states that have had this phenomenon (Oklahoma and Kentucky). We had to dig something, and we found a memo from the Idaho Department of Education that said Idaho's High School graduation rate is (allegedly) rising. In 2018, 80.7% of pupils completed their A-levels. In the previous year it was 79.97 %, compared with 79.66 % in the previous year. Well, they are technically right. For the 2018 graduation year, they managed to complete 81.4% of their students. Yes, that's lower than the national average, but look at previous years. Not to throw numbers at you, but in 2011 was 71%, 2012 was 72%, 2013 was 74%, 2014 was 75%, 2015 was 78% and 2016 was 79%. Do you see a trend? We do!
