Throughout the twentieth century, the Adventures of Huckleberry Finn became famous not only as one of Twain's greatest achievements, but also as a highly controversial literary work. In some southern states, the novel was banned because of its widespread criticism of the hypocrisy of slavery. Others argue that the novel is racist because of the many appearances of the word tend to overlap the deeper themes of the anti-slavery novel and prevent readers from understanding Twain's true point of view. In Twain's time, the word was often used and was not always as powerful a racist slur as it is today. So by using this word, Twain is simply projecting a realistic image of Southern society. Undoubtedly, the adventures of Huckleberry Finn are of great importance in connection with its in-depth study of issues related to racism and morality, and continues to provide debate and debate to this day, reflecting the continued relevance of these concepts.
