

It is the largest secondary school in the Northern Olympic Peninsula region. Built in 1953, the facility is located on a 33-acre site within the border block of The Olympic State Park. The school has views of Juan de Fuca from the campus building. The school's mascot is the Roughriders, who portray Theodore Roosevelt on horseback in his role as the First U.S. Volunteer Equestrian commander. The colors of the school are green and white. [2] Academic Experts In addition to terrace courses, PAHS offers advanced placement courses, a variety of traditional vocational courses, four koirs, five bands, four orchestras, and a variety of fine arts courses. Junior and senior students have the option of taking courses at the adjacent Peninsular College for both secondary schools and college credits. It is the only high school in the United States to offer Klallam language courses, as it is adjacent to the Lower Elwha Klallam tribe in the Elwha River Delta and the high number of students attending the school. The 1,150 seat auditoriums were constructed in 1958 and significantly re-harmonized in 1978. In addition to the use of schools, it is a place for community art organizations such as the Port Angeles Symphony Orchestra, PALOA Musical Theatre, Olympic Barber Shop, Peninsular Men's Gospel Singer, Northwest Arts, and Ballet Workshops. Some of the famous performances hosted include Arlo Guthrie and the internationally recognized male choir of Ladysmith Black Mambazo.
