The most famous is Edward Elric from the Fullmetal Alchemist series, for which he won the American Anime Award for Best Actor in 2007. Other notable animation roles include Broly from Dragon Ball, Tamaki Suoh at Ouran High School Host Club, Fai D. Flowright in Tsubasa: Reservoir Chronicle, Dark in D.N.Angel, Kurz Weber in Full Metal Panic! Series, Zero and Ichiru Kiryu in the Vampire Knight series, Christopher Aonuma in Digimon Fusion, Nagato and Obito Uchiha in Naruto Shippuden, Ikkaku Madarame in Bleach, Qrow Branwen at RWBY and Matt Ishida in Digimon Adventure tri. In video games, he is the voice of the Omega E-123 series from Sonic the Hedgehog and Junpei Iori from Persona 3. He has participated in several Star Trek fan productions, including Star Trek Continues, where he plays Captain James T. Kirk. Mignogna has an official fanclub called Risembool Rangers. In February 2019, Funimation and Rooster Teeth severed ties with Mignogna after allegations of sexual harassment emerged. Mignogna denied the allegations and in April 2019 unsuccessfully sued Funimation and several people, accusing him of defamation and unlawful interference. Mignogna was born in Greensburg, Pennsylvania, the children of Barb Myers. [3] He graduated from Liberty University with a degree in television and film production[5][6] and taught English and speech at Trinity Christian Academy in Jacksonville, Florida. Mignogna helped produce and arrange some of the songs on dc talk's first album. [4] [5] He was a seasonal officer in the Ocean City Police Department. In 1990, Mignogna moved to Houston, Texas, where he was an instructor in film and video production at The Art Institute of Houston. In 1993, he participated in the American talent show Star Search, in which he sang Worth Waiting For. Mignog's career at the comic expo in Calgary, Canada, June 2011 While working in video production with John Gremillion in Houston, Mignogna became involved in voice acting at ADV Films. [4] He made his debut as Vega in the anime series Street Fighter II V.[10][11][12][12] Mignogna began participating in anime conventions, where he contacted Funimation and landed the role of Broly's voice in the Dragon Ball films. [4] In 2007, the American Anime Awards awarded Mignoginnie the Best Actor award for fullmetal alchemist. [14] [15] He often draws attention to his role as an Alchemist and at one point participated in conventions from 15 to 25 per year. [10] One of the goals of Mignog's career was to record in all major dubbing locations. He said he was the first ADV voice actor to record at Funimation in Dallas, and then I was the first to go to New York. He also recorded in Los Angeles. He tried bleach and received part of Ikkaku Madarame. [19] In unnamed productions, he voiced Qrow Branwen in the rooster teeth rwbby series. In addition to acting voices, Mignogna was involved in the production of music, sound and video. [22] He produced hundreds of jingles for advertising,[18] and was a cult leader at the First Baptist Church in Houston. [24] Mignogna sang the U.S. national anthem at several Houston Astros baseball games. As a musician, he has released several albums, some of which include English covers of anime songs from concerts, including funimation dub of one piece and dragon ball series. He also handled some of the ADR directions for Claymore's English dubbing, in which rigaldo voices. Mignogna was involved in several fan productions, including Fullmetal Fantasy[18] and Star Trek: Phase II. He directed KITUMBA and played Malkthon Klingon, and was directed by Mindsifter. [10] [13] In 2012, Mignogna collaborated with starship farragut. He directed and played Captain James T. Kirk in their online series Star Trek Continues. [26] [27] [28] Mignogna received good reviews for his writing, directing, executive production and star trek continues, especially for his role as Kirk, respectfully using William Shatner's exceptional mannerisms and rhythm. (October 2020) After the English edition of Dragon Ball Super: Broly, which features Mignog's vocal work, accusations of sexual harassment committed by Mignogna began to appear on Twitter, some of which date back as early as 1989. [1] [31] [32] Using the hashtag #KickVic, many accounts claimed to have kissed, groped and commented on fans without their consent, some of whom were incomplete. [31] [32] Voice actresses Monica Rial and Jamie Marchi wrote on Twitter about their support for the utterers and alleged that he had also sexually harassed them. [1] [33] On January 22, 2019, Tammi Denbrow, Executive Director of one week later with the termination of the contract. On February 5, Rooster Teeth severed business relations with him, and Funimation changed its role to Morose Mononokean. [37] [38] Many anime conventions removed him from the guest list. [34] Mignogna issued a #IStandWithVic statement of regret during his 2019 Bak-Anime panel and again via Twitter on February 13, 2019. [1] On February 20, Mignogna confirmed on Twitter that he was taking legal action, [43] and later filed a million-dollar lawsuit against Funimation, Rial, Marchi, and Ron Toye for defamation and disatson. On June 12, 2019, Funimation filed a response denying Mignog's allegations. On June 26, Mignogna was overthrown. On July 1, Funimation filed an application to dismiss the lawsuit. On July 19, Rial, Marchi, and Toye filed lawsuits against SLAPP with ten statements, including from Kara Edwards and Michele Specht,[7][1] as well as several allegations that he had also made unwanted advances toward Mari Iijima. On July 30, both fans made another statement from the Funimation investigation. Mignog's team had to submit a response by August 30, but Beard missed the deadline by 27 minutes, citing technical problems, and later filed a notice of withdrawal and re-submission of the statement on September 2 due to form flaws. One of the statements was the testimony of Chuck Huber. 49] As a result, Mignogna received a court order to appear at the hearing scheduled for 6 September to hear the defendants' anti-SLAPP applications[1][50] but did not attend the hearing. [50] but did not participate. [49] At the hearing, seven of the twelve cases, in particular against Marchi, were dismissed and Mignogna had to pay all its legal fees and a further ruling was scheduled for thirty days. [51] On September 17, Judge John Chupp ordered both legal teams to mediate until October 3 and ruled on all outstanding orders in the event of mediation failure. [53] On October 4, Judge Chupp announced that the remaining cases had been dismissed. Mignogna filed an appeal on October 24, with a hearing scheduled for November 21. Chupp later ruled that Mignogna had to pay \$223,042.42 in attorney's fees to the defendants. On October 24, Beard appealed to the court of appeal. From 2006 to 2018, she was in a relationship with actress Michele Specht.
