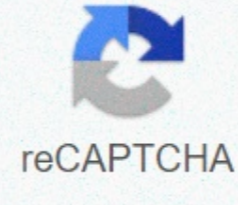




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You're never weird on the internet summary

Genre: Memoirs, Nonfiction In her memoir, You Never Weird on the Internet (almost), Felicia Day explains how being a strange man with a strange upbringing led to her strange and highly successful career as an actress, writer and producer in the Internet world. It's a cute, engaging memoir that sounds just like Felicia sounds in all her other endeavors - smart, self-deprecating, funny, and insecure. It's also short and quite superficial. Felicia shares some very personal things, but it also leaves a lot of unanswered questions. Memoirs is fun and she has some important things to but it's not very deep. The day begins with a conversation about his experience with being homeschooled in Mississippi. Mississippi. her home-schooling seems to have been quite erratic, it worked because at the age of 16 she was admitted to the University of Texas on a full scholarship because of her violin talents. She graduated with a 4.0 average and a double major in mathematics and music. She talks about college as embarrassing (her mom drove her back and forth to school every day) but also interesting (she liked to push herself to success). Day has the enormous compulsion to be perfect in any endeavor - my favorite moment in the book was when one of her professors gently told her that if she got a B in her class, the rest of her life would be much easier. Spoiler - she got A after all: One semester later, I'm really a graduate with 4.0. I did it. And after that, my GPA did... No problem. I never planned on going to graduate school. I don't apply for a job that used grades as a measurement. I don't need that GPA for any one reason other than to say I have it and impress people. I could turn this into an argument for Let's reward the highest GPA after college in life! Can we get priority seating in the Southwest? Free monthly refueling at Starbucks? WHAT to do four years of my life chasing this arbitrary number worth IT?! (Great idea. never going to happen.) Or I can argue that if I had been easier on myself and got 10 percent worse grades I could have had 50 percent more friendship and fun. If someone takeaway from this story Felicia Day said not to learn!, I'll punch you in the face. But I say don't chase perfection for perfection, or for anyone else at all. If you're aiming for something, make sure it's for the right reasons. And if you fail, it will be a better lesson for you than any success you will ever have. Because you learn a lot by screwing up. Be perfect... Not much. After college, Day continued his acting career. During this time, she developed a dependence on the game in World of Warcraft. This period of time inspired her online show, the Guild. Much of the book focuses on the development of the show, its impact on her career and her goals, and her struggle with severe anxiety and depression. Your feelings about you are never Weird... will depend largely entirely on your feelings about Felicia Day. She has what TV Tropes calls an adored personality that some people find grating and others find irresistible. Her book fits the same tone that Felicia fans will use to follow her online - self-deprecating and funny. Day seems to be trying to talk primarily to audiences who aren't internet savvy - people who can't understand the appeal of fandom, people who don't get the internet unites us in good and bad ways, and people who don't With games. She is very careful not to let out tell all, because the day is full of If you want to hear about her sex life, or get all the dirt on her roles, you'll leave disappointed. I loved hearing her talk about the power of online fandom, and how things like gaming and building online communities helped her develop as a person. But I wanted the Day to go deeper. Here are some of my questions: How does Felicia recover from her World of Warcraft addiction? One minute she realizes that she has an addiction and seemingly the next minute she is over it. What was it like to give up such a huge part of your life? How did she do it? How does she manage her addiction and still play? Day does a great job of showing how and why she became addicted, but completely obscured the recovery process, and I wanted more. Day talks about having severe depression and anxiety over the past few seasons of the Guild. After she got more of a handle on her physical and emotional health, Felicia was able to think about other people and she realized that her actions made things difficult for her friends, family and colleagues. What did she do about it? Did she use this awareness to deepen her commitment to taking care of herself? Could she make amends to those people in her life? Geek and Sundry is a huge undertaking, but she barely mentions it. What does that mean? What makes it profitable? How did she wash him off the ground? How did it affect her personal and professional life? I know Day likes to keep it stylish, but can't we have one little peek of the day on the set of Buffy the Vampire Slayer, or what he wanted to be in Doctor Horrible? Day is also well known for her work on Supernatural, where she had a rather groundbreaking role that ended in a way that upsets many fans, but she doesn't talk about it at all. While I don't watch Supernatural, I wanted to hear about his time on the show and that he wanted to play a groundbreaking character. Day is only in her thirties, so while the book ends with a neat happy ending (Day cut out the perfect job for herself) I'd like to hear about her hopes for the future, both personal and professional. Maybe she's not thinking about the future, but she prefers to focus on the present moment - in that case, I'd like to hear about it. All in all, I liked this book. I read parts of it out loud, laughing, mine. I giggled a lot. I read it all in a few hours. It's fun to read with some very important things to say - take care of yourself, treat your mental health, how serious you are about your physical health, don't be afraid to make mistakes, and take your own weirdness and creativity. How fast, light to read, it's great. However, I felt that he raised a lot of questions only to drop them dramatically.
