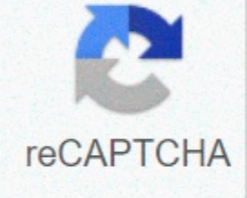




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Wilson area school district pay scale

Custodians work to keep school buildings clean. Their working hours vary between day shift and afternoon shift. The day shift cleans up after lunch and other student activities, and the afternoon shift does deep cleaning such as vacuuming and mopping floors. Lead custodians, who manage cleaning crews, make a little more than the average concierges. The average annual salary of a custodian in the U.S. is about \$22,210, as of 2012, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. This is about \$10.68 an hour. The salary is a little higher for school guards. Some areas of the country pay school cuenders better than others, and wages may also differ in the same area between school districts. The BLS indicates that as of 2010, the lowest paid jobs offered about \$7.86 an hour and the highest paid positions reached about \$17.88 an hour. A comparison of salaries from 2012 shows that some areas of the country tend to pay more. New York school custodians earned an average salary of \$32,000, but those in Florida earned only an average of \$26,000 a year. When looking at the salary for a particular area, also take into account the cost of living. For example, Indiana school custodians earned about \$29,000 a year, just \$3,000 less than New York, where the cost of living is higher. Part of the salary package for school curreers includes benefits. School janitors on average enjoy the same vacation days as other faculty, except for the summer holidays, when some of the deeper-cleaning projects are completed. In addition, the function usually includes medical and pension benefits that cannot be offered by smaller companies that employ a custodian. According to a 2002 study by the National Education Association, about 67 percent of school custodians are paid by the hour. The rest get an annual salary. Some 93 percent of school guards have full-time jobs. Janitors and construction cleaners earned an average annual salary of \$24,190 in 2016, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. On the low side, janitors and construction cleaners earned a 25th percentile salary of \$20,000, meaning 75 percent earned more than this amount. The 75th percentile salary is \$31,490, meaning to earn 25 percent more. In 2016, 2,384,600 people worked in the U.S. as janitors and construction cleaners. Although their job titles vary depending on the branch of service, they are at the highest level of military management in times of peace and war. Only in wartime can an additional star be added by the army, navy and air force. A Navy one star rank is the same as one star rank in the other services. The corresponding titles for general officers in the Navy are as follows: O-7 Brigadier General = Rear Admiral = Rear Admiral (RDML) O-8 Lieutenant General = Rear Admiral (RADM) O-9 General = Vice Admiral (VADM) O-10 General = Admiral (ADM) There are three ways to become an officer in the armed forces. The majority of officers are commissioned after graduating from a university or university, often having earned a degree through a Reserve Officers Training Corp. (ROTC) program. Officers may also be commissioned after completing a professional degree, such as medicine, dentistry or law. A select number of officers are graduates of one of the service academies, either the U.S. Military Academy (Army) at West Point, the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis (Marines and Marines) or the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs. Admissions to the academies is highly competitive and requires an appointment of a U.S. official, usually a senator or a member of Congress. Enlisted service members, who have exemplary records, may apply to Officer Candidate School (OCD), which trains soldiers, who may not have a college degree, to serve as officers. Most officers begin their Army careers as a second lieutenant (pay grade O-1), although newly graduated doctors, dentists and veterinarians begin at the rank of captain (O-3). Depending on the needs of the military, an experienced professional can even enter at a higher rank, but it is rare. To become a general, you need to be promoted by all ranks to O-7, which usually requires distinction in the chosen area and at least 20 years of military service. It is very rare for an officer trained through OCD to reach the rank of general. General officers work in different environments, depending on their career area. A general officer may lead a hospital or a group of satellite clinics. He may be superintendent of an educational institution, such as one of the service academies or an advanced training programme. General officers serve as strategic tactical leaders in peacetime and when the nation is at war. A sergeant general's salary starts at \$8,640.60 per month. The top salary for a general is \$15,800.10 a month, for an O-10 with more than 40 years of military service. That's a salary range of 189,601.20 per year, depending on the rank and years of service. General officials receive a housing allowance, adjusted for local living expenses, as well as medical, dental and vision benefits. As with anyone in the military with more than 20 years of service, general officials are entitled to a pension after military retirement. A retired general can go on to a civilian career with the government or the private sector, usually at a high level of responsibility and pay. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics does not project employment prospects for military jobs. The needs of the army dictate the number of positions available to officers in the armed forces. The BLS survey lists the annual income of private school teachers at the level of secondary education as \$50,797, while the NCES survey lists \$39,890. Secondary-level teachers are more often hired based on their expertise in their field. Therefore, they are more likely to be hired based on their experience and higher education performance. The NCES survey shows an average base salary for public school teachers of all levels of \$49,630. The average base salary for all private school teachers is \$36,250. Teaching at a public school and teaching at a private school are different experiences. However, private school teachers generally live with lower annual incomes and fewer benefits.
