For the first two years of Obama's presidency, Carney was director of communications for Vice President Joe Biden. Prior to his government service, Carney worked at Time Magazine for 20 years and was the magazine's Washington bureau chief from 2005 to 2008. As a Washington-based reporter, Carney regularly appeared on several political talk shows, including this week with George Stephanopoulos for ABC News. Carney has been the senior vice president of global corporate affairs at Amazon since March 2, 2015.
