National accreditation applies to for-profit, professional and commercial schools. National accreditation agencies include the Accreditation Committee for Career Schools and Colleges and the Occupational Education Council. In addition, the Distance Learning Accreditation Committee accredits online schools. All postsecondary educational institutions serving Michigan residents should be permit works in the state. The BLS also reports the median salary for Michigan dental hygienist, less more accredited dental hygiene programmes. Mechanic Schools Students seeking a mechanic's degree from a commercial school in Michigan can speciality in areas such as automotive repair, diesel engine repair, industrial machinery, or aviation maintenance. These programs require 1-2 years of study, depending on the program's focus. Automotive mechanics often work in dealerships or independent repair shop repair shops, repair and maintenance of passenger vehicles. Auto mechanics must obtain certification from the Michigan Secretary of State. The BLS reports that these professionals make an average salary of \$43,980. Diesel engine mechanics specializes in the maintenance of repair of commercial trucks and heavy equipment. They work with merchant fleets, merchants, or specialized repair services. Diesel mechanics make an average salary of \$47,650. The mechanics of air travel can also work for airlines or airport operators. This specialization requires certification from the Federal Aviation Administration. Flight mechanics earn an average of \$57,410. Industrial machine mechanics work in manufacturing plants to ensure the proper operation of the equipment. One of the state's fastest growing areas, Michigan plans to grow jobs by 10% between 2016 and 2026. These professionals usually make \$19-\$30 per hour. Learn more about accredited assembly schools. Paralegals and Paralegals law schools help lawyers with case management, legal research, and office efficacy. These professionals usually have an associate degree. Paralegal students take courses in areas such as criminal justice, legal research, and legal writing. However, legal assistants must work under the supervision of a licensed lawyer. The state projected an employment increase of 14.5% for paralegals between 2016 and 2026, with the BLS reported an annual median

Radiology technician schools are trained to perform diagnostic imaging tests, radiological technicians can work in hospitals, medical groups, or imaging facilities. These professionals may receive an associate degree or certificate. Students take classes on topics such as patient safety, anatomy and image assessment. Education includes classroom lectures and clinical training. Michigan does not require state approval for radiology technicians, but some specializations require additional training and certification, such as mammography and MRI technology. The Joint Review Committee on Radiological Technology Education is akreating radiological technology programmes, including radiography, radiotherapy, MRI and medical dosimetric programmes. Accredited accredited accredited technician schools. Students have access to more financial aid resources to help pay for commercial school education, such as loans, scholarships, and grants. To qualify for federal financial aid, students must submit to the FAFSA each year. However, only students in accredited schools are eligible for federal aid. The federal Pell Grant program helps students in paying for post-secondary education, with a maximum award of \$6,345 for the 2020-21 academic year. This needs-based programme takes into account the cost of the institution selected by the student, the enrolment status and the expected family contribution. States, schools, and philanthropic organizations can also use FAFSA information to determine financial fees. Since some programs offer funding for the first-come, first served basis, students must submit to the FAFSA as soon as possible. Unlike loans, scholarships and grants do not require repayment, which makes them ideal forms of financial support. The next section outlines several scholarship options for students at vocational schools in Michigan. Scholarships are also awarded to beneficiaries based on factors such as need, scientific outcome, and community participation.
