Whether you're going it by itself or traveling with a group, there are activities for everyone, from criteria such as swimming and hiking to the most unusual things to do in an American national park, such as climbing an ice waterfall or snorkeling in a shipwreck. Regardless of the time of year or weather, be sure to check with the park service before visiting to make sure the park is open to the public and that activities of interest are available. Otherwise, you might get everyone back in the car just to go home disappointed. Forget playing with waves, tubes and wakeboarding, White Sands National Park gives you the chance to bring sandboards and sleds for use in giant sand dunes. You can rent it right outside the park, bring it yourself, or take it out of the souvenir shop. Sled the dunes for the first time, take them slowly and don't underestimate the speed at which you can pick up down these dunes. Hike down smaller slopes and slide down to get used to the sport before trying out larger dunes. Sand is not as forgiving as snow, and it is common to come out of this experience with some scrapes if you are not careful. Going down a river or crossing a quiet lake is an exciting, gentle or a mixture of both, but kayaking through the caves of the Channel Islands just outside L.A. is simply awe-inspiring. You can start your excursion with a ferry to the islands where you will get the chance to do whale watching with a little dolphin before jumping into the real reason you are there. The tour company can take you to a partially submerged sea cave in the group or venture on your own. But even experienced cajackers should be prepared for the unique dangers possible by cave trappings. If you or your fellow travelers are inexperienced kayuckers, it is better to go with a tour group. Don't worry, the tour lasts more than 3 hours, so everyone will have the opportunity to lead the expedition through the caves, with plenty of opportunities for photos and breaks during paddling. If the sun is not your thing, or if you're looking to go somewhere on a trip that's a little less than the sandy beaches of the south shore. Denali National Park may have what you're looking for. To see Denali in the best light, go in winter but try to wear warm clothes for the Alaskan climate. One such event is climbing a frozen waterfall at Municing Falls. To be clear, this is not climbing the rocks beside the waterfall to reach the top. You will climb the actual ice of the waterfall. Climbing vertical sheets of ice is almost always a difficult proposition, but keep in hand that if you take the right equipment and hire a gualified guide, you can expect the experience to be thrilling and breathtakingly safe. Novice climbers can always choose easier challengesGet the feel of ice climbing without jumping into situations they're not ready to take on. National parks are not for wandering the wilderness or admiring the beauty of natural landscapes. In Colorado's Mesa Verde National Park, you'll explore the ancient Pueblon ruins to learn about early civilizations and the culture of living on the charming cliffs of ancestor Pueblo. On your own, you can stand at countless amazing viewpoints and see the cliffs. Or, when you book a tour with park rangers, you climbed a 32-foot ladder straight up the cliff face before scrambling to a medium-sized cliff dwelling known as a balcony house, where people stood generations in front. There are also other cliff dwellings, including cliff palaces, longhouses and step houses. California's Cabrillo National Monument gives you a chance to see what life is like under the intense waves of the ocean. As the tides unfold into the ocean, they reveal a fragile tidal pool ecosystem for everyone to see and explore. Make it a family outing and show your child's assogin chuks, octopuses, and stares that live in their natural habitat. Just remember that the life of plants and animals here is delicate, so be aware of where you walk and what you touch. A great way to explore the tidal pool is with a ranger-guided walk available at most low tides. Before you go, check the tidal chart to know when the tides occur. Find Dry Tortugas National Park by boat or seaplane, 70 miles west of Key West, Florida. The park is mainly by sea and includes 100 square miles, but 1% of this place is dry land in the form of seven islands. Jefferson Island, a 19th-century military site, occupies the second largest island, Garden Key. The massive fort was never attacked during its years of action, but during the Civil War, the port was used by Confederate warships to block southern shipping. It also serves as a prison for Union deserters, including Dr. Samuel Mudd, who set up John Wilkes Booth's broken leg. Florida is home to another interesting national park known as Biscayne National Park, where you can follow the Maritime Heritage Trail for scuba diving and snorkeling in the waters off the coast. The underwater trail will take you through six different shipwreck sites from the 1800s to the 1960s and the Fowey Rocks Lighthouse, built in 1878. Alaan Apkar, Mandalay, the sixth shipwreck of an unknown 19thcentury ship, and the waters under the Foyrox Lighthouse are the best options for snorkeling due to the shallow waters in which they lie. Shipwrecks in Elking, Alicia and Lugarno are better left to those with scuba certification and equipment. California's Sequoia & amp; Kings Canyon National Park is home to the world's largest tree, known as General Sherman. In the trunkIt stands at 275 feet high, 36 feet at its base. As you walk along the Big Tree Trail, you'll transport you to the land of giants as a giant sequoia tower on top of you. If walking through monster trees is not enough to excite you, head to Perolas, Redwood National Park and State Park with a professional experience travel operator. You will be trained and available so that you can climb the incredible California redwoods that can reach up to 300 feet high. Stand-up paddleboarding has gained popularity and can be enjoyed in many national parks. Still, Lake McDonald in Glacier National Park is one of the best places for its tranquility, beauty and access to water. Don't worry if you've ever been on a stand-up paddleboard before. The wide board provides enough space to get your footing and the only cost is refreshing water if you fall. You can rent a paddleboard, bring it with you and enjoy the amazing sunset over the lake. Drive down the iconic Sun Road and spare two hours to take in the excellent natural sights from the comfort of your vehicle before returning home from Glacier National Park. As omitted by park workers, go to the Sun Road, or Sun Road, is a two-lane highway straight through the park, even crossing the Continental Divide. High Logan Pass.
