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Michigan transfer agreement wcc

In 2012, the Michigan legislature included language in a community college appropriations bill focused on improving the transferability of core college courses by amending the current agreement of the University of Michigan Enrollment & Admissions Association (MACRAO) and renaming it the Michigan Transition Agreement. U-M's policy on implementing the Michigan University of Michigan Transition Agreement supports the principles that underlie the Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA) as announced in February 2014. We value student transparency and focus as the basis for the Agreement. The University of Michigan does not have a general education requirement. MTA courses will be individually assessed for their role in meeting the degree requirements as outlined in the MTA implementation handbook. The University of Michigan will evaluate individual courses in the MTA for transfer, and if transferred will place these courses on the student transcripts as transfer credits. Michigan Transition Agreement To implement the Michigan Transfer Agreement, students must complete at least 30 credits, with at least 2.0 in each course. These credits, which will be certified by a Michigan community college, should be met according to the following distributions: 1 course in English Composition A second course in English Composition or 1 course in Communication 1 in Mathematics from one of three roadmaps: A Digital Number , Statistics or Dosing 2 social science courses (from two disciplines) 2 courses in Humanities and Fine Arts (from two disciplines excluding studio and performance classes) 2 with laboratory experience (from two disciplines) MTA course information Below we describe MTA courses by submitting to the organization. These courses have been assessed in accordance with the distribution requirements of the College of Literature, Science and The Arts (LSA). Other schools and colleges have different requirements regarding the transfer of MTA course credits and various requirements related to the courses required for admission. The product of pronunciation is an agreement stipulating that programs at one organization be accepted by another organization without losing credit to students. In 2012, the Michigan legislature included boilerplate language in the community college appropriations bill focused on improving the ability to transfer core college courses by amending the current Michigan Association of University Enrollment & Admissions Officers (MACRAO) agreement. The language created a state committee consisting of 5 community college representatives, five individuals from public universities and four lawmakers (two from each room). The MTA has students who begin their studies in the fall 2014 semester. Students begin before falling will be able to complete the existing MACRAO Agreement until the end of summer 2019. Students can also choose to attend the MTA. Guiding principles and recommendations for an amended Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA) Make the agreement simple and easy to understand Keep student agreements focused on treating indigenous students at reception facilities Acknowledging differences between MTA and requirements degree Promote transparency between institutions to ensure accurate transfer information for students Requires students to complete at least one credit-bearing course at the MTA Awarding Organization How the MTA Agreement Works To Implement the Michigan Transfer Agreement, students must complete at least 30 credits with at least 2.0 in each course : a course on English Writing; a second course in English Writing or a course in Communication; 1 math course; 2 social science courses (from two disciplines); 2 courses in Humanities and Fine Arts (from 2 disciplines excluding studio and performing courses); 2 natural science courses include one with laboratory experience (from two disciplines). Students must complete at least one credit-bearing course at the university in order for the WCC to award an MTA award. Changes effective from 2016-2017 MTA Special Committee 2.0 were established in an effort to address topics that cannot be discussed and/or addressed during the initial development and implementation of the Agreement. Based on the work of the Commission, the following updates or clarifications have been made to the MTA agreement. A course towards a specific career, and use it in the title (for example, Mathematics for teachers), will be considered a career course; therefore, it cannot be applied to the MTA. Out-of-state credit is applicable to the MTA when deemed appropriate by the sending organization. Dual credit credits are applied to the MTA when deemed appropriate by the sending organization. Advanced Grade Credit (AP) is applied to the MTA when submitted as appropriate by the organization; however, the receiving organization may determine transferability based on its current AP acceptance policy. It is incumbent upon sending student transfer counseling organizations accordingly. NOTE: Additional pre-study areas do not apply to MTA at this time (e.g., International Baccalaureate-IB, College-CLEP, Dantes Subject Standardized Test-DSST, etc.).
