Snorkel along coast and crescent and emerald outbound reefs Biscayne National Park, or spend the day swimming with the sea life in Key Largo at John Pennekamp Coral Reef State Park, the first posea park in the U.S. Here you can dive in places like the Abyss statues of Christ and the wreckage of World War II ships.
