Vampire Knight) is a manga shujō series written by Matsuri Hino. It premiered in January 2005 in LaLa magazine and officially ended in May 2013. Hakusensha collected and published the chapters in collected volumes, concluding with nineteen volumes published in Japan. The manga has been internationally successful, graduating for publication in Spanish, French, Italian, Portuguese, and its argentina edition by LARP Editores which was released in December 2010. The manga series is licensed in English by Viz Media, which has released the nineteen volumes. The English adaptation premiered in the July 2006 issue of Viz's Shōjo Beat magazine, and the collected volumes are published quarterly. Two dramatic CDs were created for the series, as well as a two-season anime adaptation with thirteen episodes each. Produced by Studio Deen, the first season of the anime series aired in Japan on TV Tokyo between April 8, 2008 and July 1, 2008. The second season aired on the same station from October 7, 2008 to December 30, 2008. The anime uses many of the same voice actors that were used for drama CDs. Argument The only thing Yuki remembers from her childhood is that at the age of five, lost in winter, she was attacked by an out-of-control vampire, a situation in which she was rescued by another vampire, named Kaname Kuran. He took her with Kaien Cross, who becomes his adoptive father and later, in the Cross Private Academy. However, the elite academy hides a secret: night class students are actually vampires. The director and Kaname believe that a peaceful coexistence of human and human beings is possible; Thus Yuuki, along with another student, called Zero Kiryuu, must be guardians of this secret and make sure that the day class never learns of each other's nature. Pyramid Day Class characters that show the population level of the different vampire breeds, as presented in the manga. Yuki Cross / Yuki Kuran (黒山 優山 / 玖山 優山, Kurosu Yuki / Kuran Yuki?) Voice of: Yui Horie When she was 5 years old she was attacked by a vampire, but Kuran Kaname saved her from being devoured and killed him. This is the first memory he has of his childhood. He has no others before the age of 5, causing him a lot of burden, and he desperately tries to remember, even if he has to have a bad drink. Ten years later, as the adopted daughter of Cross Cross Cross Academy director Kaien, she is the keeper of Class Day with Kiryuu Zero. Guardians prevent day class students from being harmed by the evening class (whose students are all vampires, led by Kuran Kaname thoroughly) or normal students from discovering the secrecy of this class. Zero is in love with her, but Yuuki is not entirely clear about her feelings for him, as she has been in love with Kaname since she was a child. In the manga, when she and Zero say goodbye, Yuuki realizes that part of her heart belongs to Zero and end up kissing. In the following chapters, when a year is supposed to have passed, Kaname tells Yuuki that he knows his heart is divided between him and Zero. His birthday is July 10. In the second season of the series and the very advanced manga, she begins to have nightmares announcing a change, then Kaname decides to end her suffering and, through a vampire ritual, wakes her up in her true form, a vampire of pure blood, because as a child her family was threatened, so her father confronted Rido and his mother sealed his vampire part by offering his life to save her. When she awakens her true nature, she realizes that Kaname is her brother and her fiancé. (sleeve) Yuuki sacrifices hion for Kaname, to give him the human life he should have had. He has a son with Zero and a daughter with Kaname. Zero Kiryo (雉山 零, Kiryo Zero?) Voice of: Mamoru Miyano Zero's parents were vampire hunters who were killed by the pure-blooded vampire Shizuka Hiou. His birthday is September 28th. The director of the academy raised him with Yuuki. There they are both prefects of class and, moreover, it is discovered that he was bitten by pure vampire blood, Shizuka, so he he too in a vampire. His problem is that he can't assimilate the blood pills so that he ends up biting yuki to get food and doesn't end up being an E-level monster. This part refers to anime, in the manga more things are discovered and continue. In the anime Yuuki still expects Zero even if he leaves, instead in the manga he leaves with Kaname and decides to hide from Scratch to make a sense of his life. At the end of the manga, Zero dies after more than 1000 years with Yuuki. They have a son together. He has always been preferred by many especially Yuuki, the director, and his master vampire hunter, which brings him many problems with his twin brother, Ichiru. Although, at the end of the second season they reconcile and Ichiru, on the brink of death, gives his life to Zero; making it very powerful and complete. Sayori Wakaba (葉 de 頼, Wakaba Sayori?) Voice from: Kana Ueda This is Yuki's roommate and best friend since high school. Yuki often called it Yori-chan. She's one of the few girls who doesn't care about night class. She is very observant, and discovers the secret of the night class towards the end of the anime (chapter 39 of the manga). Kaname Kuran night class (玖山 枢, Kuran Kaname?) Voice of: Daisuke Kishio Vampire in pure blood, lost his parents when he was very young at just 7 years old, although it is believed to have been a suicide, arises the theory of a homicide. His passion is playing with a chess board by putting and manipulating the pieces so he can protect yuuki; He saved her from the attack of another vampire as a child. His birthday is February 20th is president of the Night Class, feared and respected by the other students. Although cold with his companions, he is always friendly and sweet with Yuuki; He loves her as she loves him, although at the end of the series he shows some appreciation for them. He is jealous and at the same time furious with Zero for drinking his blood, an act he cannot do because he would tie Yuki to a fate of suffering too soon. She forgives Zero's life despite her problems because she knows how much Yuuki would suffer, plus it is useful to care for her and also because she would not be allowed so easily because even if she listens to it it is just a way to keep Yuuki around her. Kaname does not yet reveal to Yuuki that although they were raised as siblings, they are not, and he was adopted by Juri and Haruka, Yuuki's parents; that is discovered on the sleeve. He was one of the first vampire ancestors and had a companion/girlfriend who died of giving to create weapons against vampires. He sleeps for thousands of years after the event. He's awake by his uncle. His uncle makes Kaname after leaving the tomb to devour Kuran's real son when he was just a baby (also called Kaname), becoming him. Erase all memories of your past life because you wouldn't suffer. He later retrieves them and tries to do the thoroughly so that Yuuki and Aidou put him aside and not get in the way of their goal. He doesn't kill everybody. Later the fire was created with which the hunters' weapons were created, frightened and destroyed. Kaname offers his heart to create weapons again. In the end he dies, but before his heart is consumed he is frozen like Kaname. After his death, Yuuki lives 1000 years with Zero until he dies. In one of the chapters, she makes love to Kaname to get pregnant. When Zero dies, she sacrifices herself so kaname can rise as a human. In the end, she wakes up as a human and meets her daughter and zero and Yuuki's son. Manipulate all members of the night class just to protect Yuuki from his worst enemy: Rido Kuran. In fact, Kaname is Kuran's ancestor, who was awakened from his grave by Rido. For this reason, he cannot kill him, as he would be his teacher, but it should be borne in mind that unlike the relationship between Shizuka and Zero where the latter doesn't want his body to act alone, Kaname is a powerful pure blood manipulated by a hierarchy to which he can turn to his mercy. Takuma Ichijo (拓麻, Ichjo Takuma?) Voice of: Susumu Chiba is Kaname's best friend, they have known each other since childhood and he is their right-hand man. His grandfather belongs to the Council of Elders. In season two, Takuma must protect Rido, who is in Shiki's body, even against Kaname, but then reciting the next sentence I betrayed you like a vampire, but I will not betray you as a friend, fight his grandfather to help Kaname, after this disappears into the collapse that caused this, so he can defeat his grandfather , finding only his sword. In the manga this did not happen, he barely fought with his uncle, but was stopped by the thorough Shiki Senri?) Voice of: Sochiro Hoshi is one of the youngest of the night class. She works as a model with Rima Touya and at the same time they are very close, they always look together. He has a strong relationship with Ichijou, as with Rima, so together they will exterminate E-level vampires, when they receive the Order of the Senate (Ichijou's grandfather is part of it). His father is Rido Kuran, Yukki's kaname and uncle, so they would become cousins. His attitude is very carefree, so he is always encouraged by Ichijou. His weapon is a whip that develops with his blood. At the end of the second season of the anime, he goes in search of Ichijou accompanied by Rima, finds Rima's sword and decides to find his owner to return it. In the manga, in recent chapters, he continues to demonstrate this loyalty to Ichijou, and has shown a love for Rima interpretable as love. Rima Touya (矢 莉穂, Rima Touya?) Together with Shiki she is one of the youngest in the class and also works as a model. She is very close to Shiki and that is why they are always together, her attitude is very cold, she hardly ever sees her way away from Senri Shiki who likes to look after and feed her chocolates. His skill is lightning. Ruka Souen (早 瑠佳, Souen Ruka?) One of the vampire girls. Cold-minded, he is attracted to Kaname, has even allowed him to drink his blood. However, this does not correspond to your feelings; he drank his blood only so he could control himself and not drink yuuki when Yuuki went to visit him at the academy. She is one of the most faithful and protective with Kaname. He feels disgusted by Yuuki, because he doesn't like the interest the other has in him. Although at the end of the series, she shows that she accepts it when she discovers she is Kaname's sister. Their power is to make their enemies fall into a trance that makes them fight each other. In recent chapters of the manga, he protects Zero from Kaname during a fight (which breaks out due to the chase against Kaname for wanting to exterminate Pure Blood): So he breaks his treatise allied with him. Seiren (漣, Seiren?) Voice of: Risa Mizuno[1] He is Kaname's un official bodyguard, always willing to protect and help him. As little as Kaname pronounces his name, it appears out of nowhere. Content from the manga written by Matsuri Hino, Vampire Knight is published in the monthly magazine LaLa by publisher Hakusensha officially since January 2005. [citation needed] Anime Main Article: Episodes of Vampire Knight Studio Deen produced a twenty-six-episode animated adaptation, using many of the same voice actors featured in the CD drama, written by Mari Okada and directed by Kiyoko Sayama. The episodes began airing in Japan on TV Tokyo on April 7, 2008 and lasted until the end of the season on June 30, 2008. The episodes also aired on dates after Aichi TV, Hokkaido TV, Osaka TV, Setouchi TV and TVQ. The second season, called Vampire Knight Guilty, premiered the same season on October 6, 2008. The final episode aired on December 29, 2008. On July 24, 2009, Viz Media announced that it had acquired the anime license and would begin releasing it on DVD on July 20, 2010. In the UK, the first volume was officially released on DVD through Manga Entertainment on 22 November 2010. In Australia, ABC3 began airing the series in March 2011 and began airing on July 3 of that year. The series uses four pieces of theme music. The opening tracks of the first and second seasons are performed by the duo On/Off, with Futatsu no Koda for Akai Tsumi (暁). Kanon Wakeshima plays the final theme of the first season, Still Doll, and also the final theme of the second season Suna no Oshiro. The soundtrack consists of Takefumi Haketa and consists of 30 tracks (including the opening theme and the final theme). Soundtrack As an anecdotal fact, many people misunderstands understand the name of the second opening, and call it Rinne-Rondo. This is a mistake, since the name is Rondo; the reason for this confusion is that in Japan, when a foreign word is written, its Japanese equivalent is also written. However, it only takes into account how it was originally written (for example, in writing the original title of the series, it reads Vampire Knight - Kishi being "Kishi" the equivalent of "Knight", but only reads "Knight"). This opening is sung by the group ON/OFF who not only present this song in the anime, but many more in it. In the end, during the first season, the closing (final) is with the song Still Doll, by Kanon Wakeshima and during the second season the finale is Suma no Oshiro, also by Kanon Wakeshima.
