As for me and my household, we serve the Lord. Jesus' death makes a new contract between men and God, a solemn treaty based on God's merciful forgiveness. This treaty will never be forgotten, not because people consider it perfect, but because God chooses to forgive the violations of the new treaty. Forgiveness opens up a new contract, and forgiveness keeps it alive. So you and I are connected to God, not mainly because of something we have done, but because of what he has done in Christ. We remain in a treaty relationship with God, not because we live perfectly, but because God forgives perfectly. Thus, through Christ, we have the confidence to believe that nothing in all creations cannot separate us from the love of God (Romans 8:38-39). QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION: What is the basis of your relationship with God? How do you experience being bound by Christ? Prayer: Merciful Lord, what an honor and privilege to have a contractual relationship with you. Thank you for tying us to you through Christ when we receive forgiveness in faith. Thank you for supporting and strengthening our covenant with you at your mercy. How good you are to us! Can I never take for granted the fact and wonder that I'm with you? Can I never assume that your I'd rather keep me to yourself, if I could be more like you in any way. All praise you, God of the Eternal Treaty! Amen. Amen.

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
