Counting only the question marks, there are 42 questions in this chapter. For others there are something like 47 or 50 questions in Alma 5. What questions for your spiritual life do you care about right now and why? Following this model would make Alma 5 the longest temple recommend interview ever. Gospel scholar Jack Welch has grouped the questions found in Alma 5 into eight categories. I have shared these categories below with just one guestion for you to consider from each category. I recommend carefully reading Alma 5 again and determining what guestions are relevant to you and your spiritual state. Remembering God's acts for his people (Alma 5:6-9) Have you preserved enough to remember his mercy and long suffering towards them? (Alma 5:6) Knowing the essential logic of the Gospel (Alma 5:10-11) On what grounds should they wait for salvation? (Alma 5:10) Be personally converted (Alma 5:14-15) Are you born spiritually from God? (Alma 5:14) Imagining Judgment Day (Alma 5:15-24) Can you look up to God with a pure heart and clean hands? (Alma 5:19) Assessment of one's spiritual condition (Alma 5:26-30) Are you stripped of pride? (Alma 5:28) Be identified with a 'Fold' (Alma 5:39) If you are not sheep of the good shepherd, what fold are you from? (Alma 5:39) Obtaining spiritual knowledge (Alma 5:45-46) How do we assume I know of your safety [i.e. the Gospel]? (Alma 5:53-59) Will persist in assuming you're better than another? (Alma 5:19) The essence of the Gospel is that we become like God is. We want to walk like him. We want to talk like him. We want to talk like him. We want to talk like him. We are invited to reflect on how we engage with God again. And as we promise to always remember him we are given the promise to always have his Spirit to be with us. We are invited to be with Godhead. Every week is like a mini-temple recommend interview where we have a personal interaction with our Savior where we declare our gratitude for his endless love and our determination to accept this love for He always. As you teach this lesson, you can draw attention to alma's guestions and counsel that help us prepare more seriously to enter the Presence of the Lord. In particular, you can help students see that we experience a change of heart as we change from sin to fair. You can encourage them to put aside all sins, they easily doth beset [them], ... and show [their] God that [they] are willing to repent (Alma 7:15). When experiencing a change of heart, we prepare to enter the presence of the Lord (see Alma 5). Jesus Christ suffered afflictions and temptations of all kinds to save us from sin and death and to help us through the challenges of mortality (see Alma 7:7–13). Sincere repentance leads us to develop christlike attributes (see Alma 7:14–24). Start by asking students the following questions: What fears may some people have about death? What fears can people have about being brought before the Lord at trial? What do you think leads a person to feel ready to know God? You may want to record student responses to the board. After a class discussion, students study Alma 5:6-13 on their own. Encourage them to look for what Alma's father and his followers experienced. As Alma described the conversion experience? According to Alma 5:11–13, what led to this powerful change of heart? What sustained this powerful change? Write the following on the board: Alma 5:14–19, 26–31A 26–31A with a changed heart ... Let students study the verses listed on the board. Ask them to complete the sentence on a piece of paper according to the verses you have listed. The following examples can help you guide students in this exercise. A person with a changed heart ... You have received the image of God in your account (see verse 14). Exercises faith in redemption of him who created [us] (verse 15). He knows that his works on earth have been fair (see verse 16). After long enough, ask students to share the different ways in which they completed the sentence. As a class, read Alma 5:33-35, 48, 50-51, 57, studying Alma's teachings about what we need to do to look to God ... with a pure heart and clean hands (verse 19) when we enter the presence of God. What impresses you about Alma's teachings in these verses? Conclude by testifying that God is willing to extend his mercy to all of us and that repentance will help us be sanctified so that we can live in his presence. Invite students to imagine that they are missionaries and that someone they have just met has asked: What has Jesus Christ done for me? Allow students to briefly share how they would respond. Then invite them to read and reflect on Alma 7:7–13 individually, looking for answers that confirm or expand their initial responses. After long enough, invite them to share the insights they've discovered. (Some of his findings may include that the Lord has power to do all things; that he suffered pains, afflictions, illnesses and temptations of all kinds so that he could have complete compassion for our infirmations; that he experienced death to be able to break the bands of death; and that he has power to rid us of our sins.) What recurring phrases in these verses emphasize that El Salvador understands our challenges? Let the students locate and mark the sentences assume it and according to the meat. Explain that in these verses, the word flesh refers to the physical body of the Savior and also to mortality and our fallen nature. Holland's statement on page 183 in the student manual (also available on accompanying DVD A). How students consider what it means to be sucked by the invite them to reflect on this guestion: When has the Savior succumbed to you in times of judgment or temptation? They suggest that students write in their journals about The Savior's loving kindness and desire to help them. As they reflect on the experiences in which they will be strengthened to face the challenges they face now and the challenges they will face in the future. Before class, prepare a document that includes guestions about Alma 7:14–24 below. Allow enough space between guestions for students to write the answers they find. What encouraged Alma to put aside? Under what alma conditions promised eternal life to the people of Gideon? What did the Spirit rally teach Alma about these people? What did Alma perceive about the people of Gideon? How would you describe someone who has woken up in a sense of duty to God? What attributes will we have if we walk without guilt before [God]? How would you summarize what you learned from Alma 7:14-24? What steps do you need to take to develop Christlike attributes? Read President Dieter F. Uchtdorf's next statement of the First Presidency: Follow Christ is to be more like him. It's learning from your character. As sons spirit of our Heavenly Father, we have the potential to incorporate attributes of Christ into our life and character. El Salvador invites us to learn his gospel by living his teachings. ... As we develop Christlike attributes in our own lives, step by step, they will endure [us] as in the wings of the eagles (D& & C 124:18) (in Conference Report, October 2005, 107-8; or Ensign, Nov. 2005, 102–3). Why do you think Christlike's attributes develop step by step? He explains that Alma's lawyer to the people of Gideon can help us develop Christlike attributes. Give each student a copy of the document you have prepared. Invite students to search for Alma 7:14-24 individually or in pairs to answer questions in the paper. Helping them see how Alma's attorney to the people of Gideon can help us become more Christlike. After the students have finished this task, invite some of them to share their summaries with the class. Then invite everyone to quietly consider this question: Which of Alma's instructions should focus on how they strive to become more Christlike? Share your testimony of the truths you've discussed with students.
