Volusia County, Florida Volusia County is a county located in the state of Florida. The U.S. Census Bureau's 2005 estimate for the county's population was 496,575. Although Daytona Beach is Volusia County's best-known city, its county town is DeLand, and its most populous city is currently Deltona.Volusia County is the only county of Deltona-Daytona Beach-Ormond Beach, Florida, a Metropolitan Statistical Area that is the 101st-largest metro area by population in the United States since the 2004 census estimate. Volusia County is interwoven from north to south on the important Interstate 95 and U.S. Route 1 highways. It also sits at the northeast end of Interstate 4, where it connects to Interstate 95. The history of Volusia County, founded in 1855, was named after the port of Volusia on the east bank of the St. John's River. The origin of the word Volusia is unclear, although there are several theories. The area of today's Volusia District was inhabited by the native Indians of Timucua. Timucua no longer exists as a distinct racial entity that has been decimated by war and disease after contact with European settlers. Evidence of their dwellings can still be seen in various areas of Volusia County, such as the large shell of middens at Tomoka State Park.During the British occupation of Florida, a failed colony was launched in southeastern Volusia County by Andrew Turnbull, known as New Smyrna. This colony was connected to St. Augustine, the capital of eastern Florida, via Kings Road. After the failure of the settler colony, many minor heritage took a 70-mile (110 km) path to life in St. Augustine.The Seminole Indians, descendants of the Creek tribe of Alabama and Georgia who resisted forced relocation to Indian territory also camped in different parts of Volusia County. During the Second Seminole War (1836ܲ) a large sugar plantation in what is now the city of Daytona Beach was burned by Seminole.On the east bank of the St. Johns River in Volusia, south of today's Debara, General Winfield Scott founded a fortress/warehouse in 1836 called Fort Florida. Geography According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 1,432 square miles (3,710 square kilometers), of which 1,103 square miles (2,857 km) is land and 329 square miles (853 km) of which is water. The total area is 22.98% water. Volusia County is bounded to the west with the St. Johns River and Lake Monroe and the Atlantic Ocean to the east. Roughly the size of Rhode Island, Volusia is located 50 miles (80 km) northeast of Orlando, 60 miles (97 km) north of Kennedy space center, and 89 miles (143 km) south of Jacksonville.Volusia County is the only county in the Deltona-Daytona Beach-Ormond Beach Metropolitan Statistical Area. Regions Volusia county government divides the county into three regions. This is a parallel with the three callers used by BellSouth, a regional telephone company: East Volusia – also known as the Greater Daytona Beach Area, or Halifax Area (named for the Halifax River that runs through the area), this region includes the cities of Daytona Beach, Daytona Beach Shores, Holly Hill, Ormond Beach, Ponce Inlet, Port Orange, and South Daytona; and surrounding unregistered areas close to these cities. Southeast Volusia - also known as the larger New Smyrna Beach Area, this region includes the cities of New Smyrna Beach, Edgewater, and Oak Hill; close to these cities. West Volusia - also called Saint John River Country (named after the River St. John, which lies nearby), this region includes the cities of Barberville, Debary, DeLand, De Leon Springs, Deltona, Glenwood, Lake Helen, Orange City, Pierson, and Seville; as well as the surrounding unregistered areas near these cities. Deltona is the largest city in volusia county. Five of them are elected by the district, the regional chairman and the representative at the county level. The Regional Council sets out decrees and policies for the region. It also reviews and approves the regional budget annually. The Commission appoints a regional manager who fulfills the will of the Commission and ensures day-to-day matters. The elected prosecutor is drying up cases for the public. Defendants may be represented under the auspices of the office of an elected public defender. The county elects a sheriff who is immediately accountable to the courts, but also to the state for enforcing state laws. Volusia County sheriff's deputies provide law enforcement to unincorporated areas of Volusia County, as well as assistance in various city police departments such as the Daytona Beach Police DepartmentMany volunteers work alongside paid professionals. Included are the Citizen Observer Program (C.O.P.), C.O.P. volunteers work under the direction of the county sheriff and play a role in the county's police operations. The Volusia County Branch Jail is a modern facility located on the US-92 (International Speedway Boulevard) highway, approximately halfway between DeLand and Daytona Beach. The county jail holds prisoners who have been sentenced to a year or less. Longer sentences must be carried out in state prisons. The Region library centrally controls 16 libraries. The collections included 869,491 books, 83,943 videos, 58,784 audio materials, 2,051 magazines and newspapers, more than 100,000 government documents and 51 licensed databases. Personal computers for public use are connected to broadband in all libraries. An estimated 230,000 Volusia County residents have library cards. One library card is valid in all locations and materials are loaned between locations via daily courier service and outside libraries via inter-library loan. Library cards are free for all residents of Volusia County. Economy Total metro gross product (GMP) for the Volusia County economy increased from \$12.98 billion in 2005 to \$13.69 billion in 2006; about \$709.9 million. GMP is an annual measurement of total economic output and sales of goods and services provided within the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA), which includes all of Volusia County and its 16 cities. GMP's \$13.69 billion represents a significant circulation of new capital resources in an economy inhabited by just over 500,000 residents. Local consumer confidence continued immigration an estimated 28,800 new residents, new capital investment in new construction exceeding \$1.11-billion and steady growth in professional and health services continue to drive much of the county's economic viability. Volusia County's manufacturing sector maintains a stable and stable position within the local economy contrary to the declining trends encountered elsewhere in the state of Florida. The total number of manufacturers present in the county rose to more than 430 in 2006 and accounted for a large portion of the county's GMP. Manufacturing maintains one of the highest of all average wage levels within the region and generates a higher rate of economic impact circulation than any other business sector that includes the local economy. The Volusia County's manufacturing sector generated an average annual wage of \$37,632 in 2006, well above the county's with an average annual wage of \$32,200 for all workers. Demographics There were 443,343 people, 184,723 households and 120,069 families living in the region for the 2000 census. The population density was 402 people per square mile (155/km). There were 211,938 residential units at an average density of 192 per square mile (74/km). The racial composition of the county was 86.11% White, 9.29% Black or African American, 0.31% Native American, 1.00% Asian, 0.04% Pacific Islander, 1.82% of other races, and 1.43% of two or more races. 6.57% of the population were Hispanic or Latino of any race. According to the 2000 census, 13.7% were German, 11.5% Insh, 11.2% English, 10.7% American and 8.7% Italian. 50.40% were married couples, 10.90% had a wife who did not have a husband, and 35.00% were non-family. 27.90% of all households were individuals and 13.60% had someone who lived alone and who was over 65. The average household size was 2.32 and the average family size was 2.82.In the county the population was spread out with 20.30% under the age of 18, 8.20% from 18 to 24 years, 25.30% from 25 to 44 years, 24.20% aged 45 to 64 and 22.10% who were aged 65 years or older. The median age was 42 years. For every 100 women there were 94.50 men. For every 100 women aged 18 and over, there were 91.80 men. The median household income in the county was \$35,219, and the median income for a family was \$41,767. Men had a median income of \$30,573 versus \$22,471 for women. Per capita income for the county was \$19,664. Approximately 7.90% of families and 11.60% of the population were below the poverty line, including 16.30% of under-18s and 7.10% of over-65s. It's a cheap way to get around and is wheelchair accessible. Buses offer services throughout the region from Monday to Saturday from 07:00 to 19:00. Some limited bus services are offered in Eastern Volusia in the evenings and on Sundays. Buses run to most places and places of interest. The price is \$1.25 per trip, \$3.00 for a one-day bus ticket or \$40 for a 31-day ticket (valid for all VOTRAN routes). There is also a transit station VOTRAN (Intermodal Transit Facility - ITF) located inside the Volusia County Parking Garage in Daytona Beach.Service between Volusia County and Orlando is provided by LYNX of Orange City, serving Heathrow and Downtown Orlando via Interstate 4. The LYNX route operates Monday through Friday with three routes in each direction. The regular fare is \$3.50 per trip or \$80 for a monthly pass. The service to Orlando is to be expanded in the form of SunRail, a suburban rail line from Volusia to Osceola County with an early phase beginning in 2013. At an early stage, the service will only be extended to Debary. DeLand Amtrak station is planned to expand in 2015. Education Public Elementary and Secondary Education is handled by Volusia County Schools. Some of the larger private schools include Father Lopez Catholic High School.
