The band has some strong song renditions from their first three studio albums. Four songs from The Band performed live on November 1, 1970. Songs: Time to Kill The Weight This Wheel's on Fire Up on Cripple Creek Syria Mosque was a 3,700-seat [1] performance venue in the Oakland neighborhood of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Built in 1911 and built on October 26, 1916,[2] it was originally built as a mystical shrine to the Mystical Temple for the Order of the Ancient Arabs and designed by the architecture firm Huehl, Schmidt & amp; Holmes in Chicago. [3] It has been considered one of the best examples of exotic revival architecture. [4] The photograph of the Syrian Mosque was taken by Edward J. Shourek in 1913-1920. The Syrian Mosque was the birthplace of the television station. [5] Located at 4400 Bigelow Avenue, the festival has held numerous events over the years, with concerts by the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and numerous internationally recognized music artists, as well as political rallies and speeches. Despite public efforts to identify the Syrian Mosque as a historic landmark, the building was demolished on August 27, 1991. Chicago Medina Temple (built a year after this building by the same firm) is a similar building that still exists (though it has now been converted into retail space). On January 11, 1949, 8:30 a.m.-11 p.m. EST, KDKA-TV (then part of WDTV and the DuMont Television Network) began its network's first broadcast based in Pittsburgh. The program began with an hour of local show coverage from the Syrian Mosque, then ended with 90 minutes from ABC, CBS, NBC and DuMont, featuring Arthur Godfrey, Milton Berle, DuMont host Ted Steele and many other celebrities. [18] The network also represented a milestone in the television industry and provided the first network of co-ed cable broadcasts involving Pittsburgh and 13 other cities from Boston to St. Louis. [19] The syrian mosque was destroyed on August 27, 1991, despite the community's efforts to determine the structure as a historic landmark. [20] The site serves as a parking lot for the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center. It was announced that the University of Pittsburgh would buy it from the medical center in 2016.
