In the first four of these relationships there is a defined better and inferior, but the better is always listed first. Father to Son also known as dirty piety This relationship is by far the core of the five. This relationship is justified by the better responsibility accepted for the boy with their better collection of knowledge and wisdom. In this relationship, the son must be wholly obedient and respectful of his father. Elder Brother to Younger Brother is to be obedient and respectful of his older brother. The older brother takes many of the same responsibilities as the father as he strives to teach younger brother in the same way his father taught him, while maintaining a good example. The younger brother should do nothing to bring shame to his family. Husband to wife also knows as marriage piety The woman has the responsibility not to bring shame to the family similar to the role of the younger brother. The man on the other hand has the duty to honor his wife while he instructs her. The man must also provide a living for his family. Emperor gains his power through heredity and military victory, but can only maintain that power as long as he fulfills the Will of Heaven, bringing prosperity, safety and cultural excellence to his territory. The last of the five relationships differs from the first in which it is a mutual relationship between a better and an inferior. Friend to Friend also knows as mutual piety The relationship of friends is a mutual respect, one one one becomes worthy of by being worthy of learning the Classics and showing the incorporation of Confucian ideals through their thinking and actions. Taking the middle road as Confucius said one would lead to the way things should be The Five Constant Relationships describe how one should behave in society, being the relationships between parent and child, husband and wife, older brother and sisters, older friend and junior friend, and ruler and subject. With these constant relationship guidelines, Li sets up a hierarchy between the two people and terms the accepted answers and actions between them. A parent must be loving, obey a child. An older brother is to be gentlemanly, and younger siblings respectfully. Men need to be good and fair, and women understand. Older friends should be considerate, revere younger friends. Li is a concept within Confucianism that dictates how those who practice it should prioritize their lives. The five relationships of Confucianism fall under the concept of Li, which is based on the philosophy of Confucius that a healthy life required a structured society. For Confucius, a good ruler is benevolent, and the son, and the son demonstrates reverence for his father. A man must be good to his wife, and his wife must in turn obey. An

older sibling should be tender for younger siblings, and younger siblings should be for their older siblings. Sisters. two friends should be thoughtful and respectful of each other. Based on these principles, Confucius believed it was possible to form an ideal relationship with everyone people encountered through their lives. The fact that three of the five relationships are known emphasises the key role family plays in Confucianism.

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
