Armstrong's husband, Scott, feels the same way. I was hoping for a boy with every pregnancy, and part of me will always advance for a child, she admits. But Kerstin once told me something that still resonates: Everything our daughters know about the boys will come to you: 'I consider it a privilege to be their vision of what a man should be. Girls experience discomfort more acutely than boys, so they are more likely to get agitated when cold or have a wet diaper. But don't be too quick to label your little princess high maintenance; her keener sense of touch also makes her more responsive to pampering and easier to sooth. Girls tend to produce more oxytocin, the human binding hormone, and serotonin, a hormone feel good. This helps explain why they are more prone to being caregivers than dolls and younger siblings. Kids are really more interested in toy cars, trucks and other moving things. Boys tend to explore their world more physically than girls, for example by banging their toys, jumping and playing hard. They have an unbridled way of expressing energy, says Adie Goldberg, co-author of It's a Baby Boy! and she's a little girl! A slew of gender prediction kits has s been born in pharmacies in recent years, and some claim to accurately predict the sex of a baby as early as five to seven weeks in a pregnancy. Peeing in a cup or pricking your finger and sending a blood sample to a DNA testing lab is quite easy, but these are not safe methods. Among the kits, urine tests, which have been controlling the presence of testosterone for ten weeks already, are the least expensive and also the least accurate. Kits that use a blood sample to detect gender are also inaccurate (your bathroom isn't a quality-controlled lab!) and expensive (often up to \$300).
