In pediatrics, nurses can focus on one of the specialties available in adult medicine, ranging from psychiatry to public health. They can also focus on a specific age group, such as infants, or work with a more diverse patient population that includes primary school-age children for adolescents. Some paediatric nurses focus primarily on educating parents and children or promoting healthy family habits. They may work for city, state or county health departments, social service agencies or health-related organizations such as the women, infant and children program. Their duties often include everything from providing physical examinations to administering vaccines. They could also work for publicly funded organizations that provide medical assistance to children in need of home health care. These home health nurses could help provide ongoing care or act as case managers coordinating the patient's treatment strategy. When a child has an asthma attack or falls on the playground, a school nurse is often the first health care professional to treat it. She provides first aid, assesses his condition and determines whether he needs more intensive treatment from a doctor or hospital. As schools integrate more children with chronic or complex illnesses into the regular student population, school nurses are also helping to monitor their condition and administer medications. For example, a school nurse may care for students with diabetes, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder and autism. Pediatric nurses sometimes specialize in treating the most urgent or intensive cases, working in hospital emergency departments or units dedicated to certain conditions and diseases. Pediatric nurses in emergency departments, for example, work in emergency rooms in hospitals designed specifically for children. They treat everything from asthma injuries to asthma attacks, stabilizing patients so that children can go home or move to specialized units such as intensive care. Nurses can also care for critically ill patients in paediatric intensive care units or treat children with cancer or other conditions Terminal. In addition to focusing on a child's physical health, pediatric nursing frequently addresses mental health issues. Some paediatric nurses work in inpatient treatment centres or juvenile detention centres, where they treat psychiatric disorders or assist in rehabilitation. They also work in psychiatric units in hospitals, where they are part of a mental health team of psychiatrists, therapists and social workers and deal with everything from bipolar disorder to phobias. Pediatrics is the specialty of health care that cares for children from birth to age 21. Many many and clinics have paediatric units, and some also have pediatric intensive care or cardiac units, where critically ill children receive care. Some hospitals, such as St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and Seattle Children's Hospital, are dedicated exclusively to child care. Pediatric nurses provide nursing care in all of these units and facilities. Any registered nurse can become a pediatric nurse. Undergraduate nursing programs do not offer specialized programs, but provide basic teaching in pediatric patient care to all practical nurses who want to specialize usually begin by applying to a unit or site that only cares for pediatric patients. Once the nurse has gained experience in managing general pediatric patients, she has a number of specialties available that she can pursue. In addition, pediatric nurses may choose to take a certification exam that recognizes their expertise and experience. A certified pediatric nurse is not necessarily a specialist. Paediatric nursing positions in advanced practice include the pediatric nurse practitioner, or PNP, and the clinical nurse specialist. NPNs provide care at a level similar to that of a physician, primarily under the supervision of a physician. NPNs diagnose and treat childhood diseases, manage chronic diseases and provide maintenance of health care, such as children's exams and vaccinations. NPNs may prescribe medications and may work in a clinic or doctor's office or hospital. Pediatric clinical nurses can provide direct care or educate staff who provide direct care. Specialized pediatric hospitals provide a number of opportunities for a pediatric nurse to specialize. Specialization may be related to the unit in which the nurse works, such as a pediatric cardiac catheterization laboratory or a pediatric intensive care unit. Some specializations involve the care of a particular group of patients, such as the pediatric/oncology hematology nurse, or phon. PHON cares for children with cancer or leukemia. Phon nurses may work in hospitals, clinics, radiotherapy centres or hospices. The Pediatric Nursing Certification Board recognizes five specific categories of pediatric nursing specialties. A paediatric nurse can work in any pediatric health care, while a pediatric emergency nurse specializes in emergency care for pediatric patients.
