Even better, organized extracurricular activities offer your child a (supervised) chance to get away from your watchful eyes. But you still get to participate by cheering on the games, applauding a two-act play or going to an art show. Whatever interests your child, give him or her a way to explore it. Your role is to offer limits, limitations and support. One way you get to practice your role is when it's time for homework. The National Association of School Psychologists says homework teaches children how to manage time, make choices and solve problems. Help your child set up a system — a place and time to study with the necessary resources — and let him or her tackle the challenges of middle school work without your hovering presence. Stay in touch with teachers even if your child assures you that this is the most uncool thing you've ever done.
