This is due to the fact that most colleges have deadlines for applications in late fall and early winter. Essentially, the College Board gives seniors a few shots at hitting their SAT goal scores right before their apps are due. Spring SAT dates are more common, with the exception of May and June. This, again, is due to the fact that there are fewer college filing deadlines in the spring than there are in the fall and early winter. These dates also target more juniors and other students who would like to take the SAT early. Further, we see that due to the large number of test dates in the fall, it is difficult to take two SATs in a row. By the time your score for one test comes out, the late registration date for the next test will often have already passed! Even if you had to go ahead and sign up for another test without knowing your scores, you may end up spending money on retake if your scores are higher than you thought they would be. Similarly, if you don't sign up for the next test, you may miss your only shot at raising points before the application deadline. Taking back-to-back SATs also doesn't give you enough time to make the most of your retake; You will probably see little, if any, improvement in your scores due to the lack of adequate preparation time between tests. Choosing the best SAT test date for you: 5 main factors lt's important to choose an SAT test date that will work well not only for anyone but you specifically. Here are five main factors you'll want to consider before committing to a test date. #1: When are your deadlines for applying to college? To date, the most important factors are your deadlines fall around January 1 (for a regular decision) and November 1 or 15 (for an early action/early decision). College Board Sends SAT to schools (for your four free score reports), starting one day before online release score, or about three to five three-five After the exam. However, not all schools have an evaluation process at once; in fact, some may take a week or so to report the scores. As a result, you may have to wait no more than six weeks after the test date for your schools to formally process your SAT scores. And that doesn't even include the extra time it takes to process orders for additional score reports (unless you have more than four schools you want to send points to). Ordering these reports will add at least another week or two once the estimates are released. Therefore, don't usually give the SAT less than five to six weeks before college apps are supposed to appear. If you order additional score reports after your grades are out, stick to the testing date more than seven or eight weeks before your due date. Keep in mind that if your schools don't receive or process your SAT scores on time, your application may be disqualified! So plan accordingly, #2: Are you applying for an SAT scholarship? Another factor is the SAT. Typically, school scholarships for the SAT will use the same timeline as college applications. If you're unsure when your SAT grades should, contact your scores should arrive sooner than with or with your app. #3: How many times will you take the SAT? You should also consider whether you can retake the SAT if you don't get the points you need for college. We generally recommend taking the SAT at least twice, perhaps three times, depending on your account goals. Here's our proposed SAT schedule: Take your SAT in the fall of your junior year Take the SAT for the second time in the spring of your junior year Take the SAT for the last time in late summer/early fall of your junior year rather than fall, you still have plenty of opportunities to take the SAT once or twice as much. You can, for example, take the SAT for the second time in June or August and the third time in October or November, However, avoid signing up for back-to-back SAT testing dates, especially in the fall of your senior year. Squeezing in too many SATs gives you hardly any time to study and probably won't raise your score by any noticeable margin. Also, trying to balance so much preparation during the school year, and as you apply to college, no less! - it's an incredibly strenuous activity. So distribute your tests as best you can. #4: How long will it take you? Before you sign up for the SAT, decide how much time you need to devote to your studies. We usually recommend three to six months to prepare the SAT. This amount of time allows space from your training sessions, so you learn without burning yourself. More importantly, however, you want enough training hours. The number of hours you have to spend on training depends on the points that you would like to improve your base SAT score by. (The basic score you get on the official SAT practice test before you start any SAT training.) Below are the (approximate) number of training hours needed to improve the overall point on the SAT: 0-30 point improvement: 10 hours 30-70 point improvement: 40 hours 130-200 point improvement: 80 hours 200-330 point improvement: 150 hours, as you can see, the longer the point of increase you want, the more hours you have to learn. Unfortunately, not everyone has a ton of time to fully devote to SAT training. At a minimum, try to watch at least 10 hours of preparation. If you only have a month or so before the testing day, you can still make a big score increases as long as you are willing to put in the effort. You can also use our last-minute SAT tips and strategies to help you get the score you need. #5: Will you have any obligations or conflicts? Finally, think about your commitments. Is there anything that you can't bear that will take place on a certain day of testing? Do you have any ongoing commitments (school or otherwise) that could prevent you from being able to focus on your SAT training? Commitments can be anything from school games and AP tests to sports tournaments and family vacations. Before you choose a testing date, make sure you are well aware of your schedule. I suggest using a planner to take note of any large chunks of time during which you will be too busy to learn from the SAT. Ultimately, if a certain test date feels overwhelming, choose another for which you will have far less commitment in the period leading up to it. Summary: What is the best SAT test date for juniors? The October and November test dates offer a lot of flexibility and plenty of time to learn and prepare for the second round if you want to take the SAT again. In the spring try to take the SAT in March or May, or not at least in June. These dates ensure that you'll have all summer to rate your scores, complete your college list, and decide whether you want to take the test again in August or fall. Scenario 2: You Senior Best Dates: August, November and December. Like all college training, the sooner the better! Try taking the SAT in August, October, October, October, The Nov. These three testing dates should have little trouble getting college points in time, assuming your earliest deadline is somewhere around January 1. Although you can opt for a December test date, too, I would only do so if your deadline is January 10 or later. December scores are usually not released until the end of December, so January 1st may play too close for some colleges. Check with your schools directly to check whether they will take SAT scores from the December test date before you sign up for it. If your regular decision-making deadline happens, especially early, as at the University of California November 30 deadline, choose the August or October test date instead. Scenario 3: You apply an early action/early decision Best Dates: June, AugustRiskier Dates: October Most early dates are November 1 or 15. The June or August test date (before your senior year) is a great choice because points from any test date should definitely get to your schools in time. These dates also give you a fall focus to fully focus on your college applications rather than on SAT training. The October deadline is a bit more risky though, as its estimates are usually not released until the end of October. So if your deadline is November 1st, October probably won't work. If your deadline is November 15 or later, however, October should be in order. Scenario 4: Your college applications do not have until February or later many schools have later-than-usual deadlines in February, March, April, May, June, July, August and even September.
